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## EmployAbility: Award-winning speaker to discuss issues related to employing people with disabilities

A recipient of America's highest honor for achievement in advancing the employment and empowerment of people with disabilities will be the featured speaker at a public forum Tuesday, October 30, in Carter Hall.

**Ms. Joyce Bender**, president of Bender and Associates International Inc., will address issues related to the employment of people with disabilities from 10 to 11:30 a.m.

Helping people with disabilities became Bender's passion after a life-threatening accident due to epilepsy caused her to suffer a cerebral hemorrhage in 1985. Brain surgery followed, and against all odds, she recovered from the accident that left her with a 40-percent hearing loss in one ear and the realization that she had a seizure disorder.

In 1988, she founded Bender and Associates International Inc. in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. The executive search firm specializes in permanent placement of technology professionals and works with Big Five Firms, Fortune 500, and High Technology companies across the nation.

Roughly seven years later, she established Bender Consulting Services Inc., a subsidiary of Bender and Associates, with the goal of providing employment to people with disabilities as full-time consultants in the information technology field.

The Pennsylvania Governor's Committee on Employment of People with Disabilities named

Bender Consulting Services its 1996 Small Employer of the Year. In 1997, it received the Power of Work Award from Goodwill Industries and in 1999 the Employer of the Year Award from hireAbility in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

In 1999, Bender also received the President's Award, the highest honor awarded by the President of the United States to an American citizen furthering the employment and empowerment of people with disabilities.

In addition to other numerous honors, Bender received the 2001 James F. Compton Humanitarian Award. The Compton award recognizes the efforts of a corporate leader to improve the quality of life for people with disabilities.

She is an executive board member of the President's Committee on Employment of People with Disabilities and is a member-at-large of the Governor's Committee on Employment of People with Disabilities. She also is a board member of the National Conference for Community and Justice, a national board member of the Epilepsy Foundation, and a regional board member of the Epilepsy Foundation of Western Pennsylvania.

Bender holds a B.S. in psychology from Geneva College. She resides in Pittsburgh.

Movies from Russia, Iran, Spain, and the United States will be featured in USI's "Friday Night in the Forum" film series.

Sponsored by the School of Liberal Arts, the series brings films to the big screen in their original 35mm and widescreen formats, and in their original languages with subtitles.

Each free film will be shown at 7:30 p.m. in Forum I with an informal discussion to follow.

### "Friday Night in the Forum"

■ **November 2 - *House Built on Sand* (Russia 1991).** Director: Niyole Adomenaite. Set on the eve of World War II, this closely observed portrait of two friends enjoying life and their leisurely passing of time in a self-imposed cycle of dependency changes abruptly with a series of remarkable images of the 1938 Stalin purges and German siege of Leningrad.

■ **November 9 - *Smell of Camphor, Fragrance of Jasmine* (Iran 2000).** Director: Bahman Farmanara. A blacklisted Iranian film director in desperation accepts an assignment to make a documentary about local funeral rites for well-paying Japanese television. In the process, he unknowingly creates a dark comedy about his own fear of impending death.

■ **November 16 - *La lengua de las mariposas (Butterfly)* (Spain 1999).** Director: Jose Luis Cuerda. Seen primarily from a 7-year-old boy's point-of-view, *Butterfly* is a nostalgic film about childhood fear set moments before the Spanish Civil War, a time when freedom seemed to hang briefly in the air though the horrors of war were imminent.

■ **November 30 - *Requiem for a Dream* (U.S. 2000).** Director: Darren Aronofsky. From the director of the highly original low-budget film, *Pi*, comes a haunting and stylistically unique film about delusional dreams and drug addiction. Aronofsky uses a masterful blend of editing and subjective camera in his adaptation of Hubert Selby Jr.'s 1978 novel, which follows a man's dream of being a wealthy club owner and his mother's obsession with becoming a game show contestant.
