## Mid-America Singers celebrate 25 years of Madrigal Feastes

The USI Madrigal Feastes will have a deepening mantle of tradition in 1994 as the Madrigal singers incorporate music brought back from a summer trip to Poland into their 25th anniversary performances December 1-4 in the University Center Dining Room.

Mr. Daniel Craig, USI music director, and Mr. Larry Goss, engineering technology professor, made the Poland trip, having been invited to sing with a Polish choir at a festival in Sweden. Mr. Craig was given permission to bring home several pieces performed by the Cantores Malborienses and the USI Mid-America Singers have been invited to come to Poland to perform next spring.

Among the historic music the USI Madrigal singers will add to their 20th century feasting will be "Veni Veni Emmanuel," a Russian harmonic setting, and Polish composer Vodansky's "Rorando Coeli," which is a double choir piece using an echo choir effect. Also on the program will be "Zdrovas," an ancient Polish religious chant that is a contemporary to the "Ave Maria."

Guests for the 1994 festivities again will dine on traditional roast beef. Dinner will start at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, December 1-2-3, and at 6 p.m. Sunday, December 4. The field has been narrowed to five candidates who seek to succeed Dr. Donald Bennett, who is retiring as vice president for Student Affairs. The five are visiting the campus over the next two weeks to become acquainted with USI and allow faculty, staff, and students to get to know them.

The schedule for the candidates will include meetings with student organizations, a campus tour, lunch with the Academic Affairs Council and Faculty Senate chair, a group meeting with Student Life units, and meetings with University administration.

The first candidate -- Dr. O. C. Bobby Daniels, vice president for Student Affairs the past five years at Lincoln University Missouri -- was here Tuesday. Dr. Jack Tharp, vice chancellor for Student Service, Indiana University at Kokomo, for 10 years -- will be here Friday, November 11.

Dr. Tharp received a B.A. from Hanover College, M.P.A. with a concentration in public management, IU South Bend, and Ed.D. in higher education, IU Bloomington. He previously held student-services positions at Kokomo and Ancilla College.

Dr. Daniels received a B.S. from Lincoln, M.A. from the University of Chicago, and Ph.D. from the University of Massachusetts-Amherst, where he was associate dean of students for seven years. He has

## **USI athletics go all Division II:**

The USI Athletic Department announced Monday it is developing a plan in which all University sports will compete at the NCAA Division II level. As part of the expansion in the Great Lakes Valley Conference (GLVC), three league teams -- Quincy University, Southern Illinois University-Edwardsville, and University of Wisconsin-Parkside -- will compete in Division II by 1996.

USI, Quincy, and SIUE are the only teams in the new conference which previously competed in Division I soccer. The change reflects the growing competitiveness of GLVC soccer. USI Athletic Director Donald D. Bennett noted several years ago, it was difficult for USI to find consistent competition at the Division II level, but the soccer programs have matured.

Dr. Bennett feels the maturing GLVC program "may make the GLVC one of the strongest Division II conferences in the nation." Dr. H. Ray Hoops, USI president, concurs. "Our objective is to be the strongest athletic program in the strongest Division II conference in the nation," he said, noting, "This

already is the case in a number of sports."

Dr. Hoops emphasized USI's opportunity for leadership in the new conference. "The new commitment of the GLVC to soccer is one USI finds welcome, and we want to play a positive role in the conference's action."

USI soccer Coach Tony Colavecchia said, "It is a progressive move for the total athletic program. The new conference members possess highly reputable soccer programs that will elevate the GLVC soccer conference to unarguably the best in the nation."

The USI action was recommended by the school's Athletic Board. A timetable for Division II competition is expected early next year. The new GLVC also includes: Bellarmine, U. of Indianapolis, IU/PU-Fort Wayne, Kentucky Wesleyan, Lewis, Northern Kentucky, and St. Joseph's. Ashland and Kentucky State will leave the GLVC at the end of the 1994-95 season.
