BICENTENNIAL HONOR CELEBRATION. The Clerical and Support Staff Bicentennial Committee, in cooperation with the Personnel Office, is sponsoring a Bicentennial Honor Celebration on May 20, 1976 in the University Center. The event will highlight 17 members of the ISUE clerical and support staff who are being honored for five or ten years of service to the University.

True to the Bicentennial theme, the celebration will feature a "Revolutionary Buffet," patriotic songs, and red, white, and blue decorations. The evening will begin with a social hour at 6:30 p.m.

Proclamation invitations will be issued soon, according to Mary Lue Russler, Clerical and Support Staff Bicentennial Committee Chairman. AMERICAN ISSUES FORUM. The April 7 American Issues Forum will present Charles Petranek, Assistant Professor of Sociology, at 7:30 p.m. in A34. The subject of the Forum will be "The Future of the American Family," in which Dr. Petranek will explore various family structures of the future, and will show that, due to better technology, families of the future will be given more freedom of choice as to what type of family structure they desire.

BICENTENNIAL CONVOCATION. The Division of Social Science is sponsoring an interdisciplinary convocation in commemoration of the Bicentennial observance during the month of April, according to Daniel Miller, Chairman of the Division of Social Science. The first session will be moderated by Quentin Davis, Associate Professor of Political Science. Mr. Davis will discuss "The Election of 1976" at 9:30 a.m. in Room 294 on April 8, 1976. He will be looking at the prospects for 1976, the issues and forces at work, and discussing selection of delegates and campaign financing as it relates to the 1976 election. The series is open to the public.

HUMANITIES FORUM. The featured speaker for the Humanities Forum on April 8 is Judy Hummel, Assistant Director, In-Service Institute. Ms. Hummel will discuss "Sex Role Stereotyping" at 1:00 p.m. in the Rare Books Room. In her presentation, Ms. Hummel will examine the women's movement as it pertains to public school curriculum materials and teaching methods, and will explore the psychological implications of sex role stereotyping in the schools. The Humanities Forum is open to the public.

"HEARTS AND MINDS" TO BE SHOWN ON CAMPUS. The movie, "Hearts and Minds," winner of the Oscar as the best feature-length documentary of 1974, will be shown in Al26 on April 9 for three showings at 2:00 p.m., 7:00 p.m., and 9:00 p.m. The film is a complex, admittedly biased mediation upon American power -- military and economic, political and social -- in the form of an examination of the United States' involvement in the Vietnam War. A critic has written, "As we become further removed from the war, I suspect that 'Hearts and Minds' will reveal itself as one of the most all-encompassing records of the American civilization ever put into one film."

LIBRARY BICENTENNIAL LECTURE SERIES. The Evansville Public Library and Vanderburgh County Public Library Bicentennial Lecture Series will feature Johnny Reising, Instructor in Life Science, on April 13, 1976. Mr. Reising will discuss "Man and His Environment" at 7:00 p.m. at McCullough Branch Library.

SPRING NONCREDIT SERIES. Twelve courses are being offered in the spring noncredit series by the Office of Continuing Education. The courses are offered for those interested in learning a new creative skill, or for persons wanting more information on particular topics. Three of the twelve courses being offered include Understanding the Metric System, Small Gasoline Engine Maintenance and Repair, and Beginning Tennis for Adults.

In the course, Understanding the Metric System, students will learn about America's newest revolution. The background of the metric system, comparison with the American system, and problems of conversion will be covered. Charles Bertram, Chairman, Division of Education and Associate Professor of Mathematics, will conduct the course for six Tuesdays, beginning April 13, at 7:00 p.m. in Ll05. The registration fee is \$20.00.

Small Gasoline Engine Maintenance and Repair is being offered by Larry Goss, Associate Professor of Engineering Technology, on April 19, 20, 26, and 27 beginning at 7:00 p.m. in Room 114, Technology Center. The course will cover instruction in disassembly, inspection, repair, and reassembly of small (single cylinder) two and four cycle gasoline engines of the type used on lawnmowers, tillers, chainsaws, etc. Hands-on experience in the repair of an engine of the student's choice. Students must provide the engine on which they wish to work All necessary tools for the course are provided. The registration fee is \$20.00.

Jack Marr, ISUE Varsity Tennis Coach, will conduct a course in Beginning Tennis for Adults for four Tuesdays and Thursdays. Two sessions scheduled to begin on April 19 have already been filled, therefore three additional sessions have been scheduled to begin on May 11. Section I will be offered from 10:00-11:00 a.m., Section II from 6:00-7:00 p.m., and Section III from 7:30-8:30 p.m. Basic tennis strokes, footwork, rules, court positions, strategy, safety and court etiquette will be covered. Participants must furnish racquet and balls. The registration fee is \$22.50

The noncredit courses are open to anyone, regardless of educational background, and are presented in a noncompetitive, informal atmosphere where interest in learning is the primary consideration. No grades are assigned, no academic credit is given, and formal admission to the University is not required. PROSPECTIVE STUDENT AND PARENT DAY, High school juniors and seniors and their parents will have the opportunity to examine college life at the ISUE Prospective Student and Parent Day on April 14, 1976. EAGLE GRAN PRIX COMING SOON! Time trials for the Eagle Gran Prix Bicycle Race will take place on Saturday, April 17 from 9:00 a.m.-3:00 p.m. The race is scheduled for the following Saturday, April 24, and will be run on the boulevard in front of the Library and the Technology Center, with the pit crews located in the Technology Center parking lot. (In case of rain, the race will be run on Sunday, April 25.) Opening ceremonies will begin at 12:00 noon, with the women's race scheduled to begin at 1:00 p.m. and the men's race at 1:45 p.m.

Set-up time has been scheduled from 7:00 a.m.-12:00 noon on the day of the race. "Each team is required to send one representative to help set up for the race," comments Dave Broderhausen, ISUE freshman and Chairman of the Eagle Gran Prix. "Failure to do so will result in three penalty laps. The penalty will be made against the first rider, who will be required to ride one pace lap, one regular lap, plus the three penalty laps -- a total of five laps or two miles," adds Dave.

Teams competing in the 5-mile women's race include Alpha Sigma Alpha, Phi Beta Chi (3 teams), Sigma Tau Hustlers, Alpha Omega Psi Little Sisters, Sigma Sigma Sigma (2 teams), and Sigma Kappa. Competitors in the 32-mile men's race include Phi Alpha, Flying Spokes, Sigma Tau Gamma (2 teams), Sigma Epsilon Chi, Peddlin Pootangs, Alpha Omega Psi, Tau Kappa Epsilon (2 teams), Chi Gamma Iota, and The Rolling Stone.

The winners of each race will receive a 1st place team trophy plus individual trophies for each of the team members. Teams who place 2nd and 3rd in each race will also receive team and individual trophies. In addition, two trophies will be given to the man and woman who qualify the fastest riding time throughout the race.

When asked who he felt would be the top contenders in each race, Dave predicted Phi Beta Chi, 1975 Champions, to be the team to beat in the women's race. Commenting on the men's race, Dave feels Phi Alpha will be the top contender, with very keen competition coming from Chi Gamma Iota, 1975 Champions.

With most of the necessary arrangements made for the '76 Eagle Gran Prix, Dave finds he has learned quite a lot from serving as Chairman. "I've learned to use my time more wisely, to be a better organizer, and to delegate authority.
