HEALTH NOTE: Will your summer be up to scratch? Probably not, if you spend it scratching a case of poison ivy. Current estimates indicate that more than 1,000,000 people in this country are destined to suffer in varying degrees from the agonizing itch and burn of poison ivy before the summer is over. It is difficult to escape this summer scourge, since it abounds in every state of the Union except California and Nevada. Records indicate that over 60% of us are susceptible to poison ivy. It attacks in so many nefarious ways that it is possible to contract the itch even when you are locked securely indoors. So sly is its approach that as late as 1800 it was believed that poison from the leaves was carried stealthily through the air by a gas. Thus anyone merely passing within 20 feet of a patch could be attacked.

Poison ivy's distressing symptoms have led to the development of more than a thousand different remedies over the past few centuries. These have ranged from chewing on the leaves to rubbing the affected area with banana skins, and use of harsh preparations which often did more damage to the skin than the plant poisoning. Recently, medical investigators have had excellent success with preparations such as calamine, celadryl rhulicream, rhulihist and other brands which contain zirconium. This material does not cure the poison ivy, but it lessens the aggravation and won't stain your clothes. It also helps free your hands to do something other than scratch all day.
