

Location

Founded in 1965, the University of Southern Indiana is located in Evansville, the state's third largest city. From its picturesque site on the Ohio River, Evansville is a comfortable drive from the major metropolitan areas of Indianapolis, Cincinnati, Louisville, Nashville, and St. Louis.

Academic Life

The University enrolls over 9,300 students and offers undergraduate majors in 60 areas of study. Several graduate degree programs also are available.

Campus Life

Beyond the classroom, students have opportunities to participate in more than 80 organizations offering co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. USI ADMINISTRATION



H. Ray Hoops, President

A native of Illinois, **H. Ray Hoops** received his undergraduate degree from Eastern Illinois University and master's and doctoral degrees in Audiology and Speech Sciences from Purdue University. He also completed an M.B.A. at Moorhead State University.

His career as a scientist and educator has included a faculty appointment jointly at the University of Michigan and Wayne State University. He published extensively and was nationally recognized for his contributions in the areas of rehabilitation of post-surgical patients with cancer of the larynx and in the analysis of language dynamics resulting from brain damage. Among his numerous publications in a variety of behavioral and medical journals was the report on a study which received the National Research Award, the highest honor of the American Speech and Hearing Association. Dr. Hoops also was named Fellow of the Association.

His administrative appointments included the directorship of the Division of Marketing in the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. He received two national service awards for that work. He also was a Senior Fulbright-Hayes Research Scholar in the College of Medicine at the University of the Philippines. Other appointments included dean of the Graduate College of the University of Northern Iowa, associate vice chancellor for Academic Affairs for the Oregon State System of Higher Education, vice president for Academic Affairs at North Dakota State University and president of South Dakota State University.

In the six years prior to becoming the second president of the University of Southern Indiana in 1994, Dr. Hoops served as the vice chancellor for Academic Affairs at the University of Mississippi. While at "Ole Miss," Dr. Hoops received the National Council of State Governments Association Award for his pioneering work on Project '95, a blueprint for the reform of education in the state of Mississippi. He also received the Peterson's Guide Award for contributions to the education of minority students in the innovative and highly successful graduate participation initiative.

Dr. Hoops serves as a member of the Deaconess Hospital Board of Directors, the Welborn Foundation Board of Directors, the Salvation Army Advisory Board, the Youth Resources of Southwestern Indiana Board of Directors, and the WNIN Board of Directors.



Steve Newton USI Director of Athletics

Steve Newton, a native of Terre Haute, Ind., was appointed athletic director in 1995.

Named to the NCAA II Great Lakes Regional Advisory Committee in 1997, Newton has brought enthusiasm and pride to the University and the Athletic Department. With an emphasis on community service, he has directed the creation of the Eagle Math program for grade school students, the Letterwinners Club, and the Screaming Eagles Scholarship program.

Newton also has placed an importance on assisting student athletes to reach their full potential both academically and athletically. To help the student athlete, he has overseen the creation of the extended aid program for fifth-year students.

Prior to taking the position at USI, Newton was serving as an assistant athletic director at the University of South Carolina. He was the head basketball coach at South Carolina from 1991 to 1993.

His duties at South Carolina included serving as the university representative for pre-Olympic preparations for the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta and the South Carolina steering committee for the Olympics.

Newton served as head coach at Murray State University from 1985 to 1991. During his eight seasons as head coach, he was 136-100 (.576). His Murray State team's best run in the NCAA Tournament was in 1988 when it defeated North Carolina State University before losing to eventual national champion University of Kansas, 61-58.

As a head coach, Newton was named the Ohio Valley Conference Coach of the Year in 1988 and 1990 and National Association of Basketball Coaches District VII Coach of the Year in 1988. He led Murray State to four consecutive Ohio Valley Conference championships and post-season tournament appearances (1988-91).

Newton received a bachelor's degree in physical education and master's in education from Indiana State University. He was named a member of the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame Silver Anniversary team in 1984. Newton and his wife Kathy have four children—daughter LeAyer, and sons Harv, Jay, and Royce.



Men's Basketball OUTLOOK

The University of Southern Indiana men's basketball team enters a new era as Head Coach Rick Herdes takes the helm of the Screaming Eagles in 2001-02.

While there will be a new face in charge of the program, the same success the Eagles have seen the past nine seasons will continue. Herdes, who has been the associate head coach the past two seasons, has been with the program for nine years and has seen his recruiting classes produce a record of 231-46 (.834). Those nine seasons also include the 1995 NCAA II National Championship team, the 1994 NCAA II Finalist team, four Great Lakes Valley Conference Championships, and nine straight trips to the NCAA II Tournament.

To help get the regime off to a flying start, Herdes has brought in **Marc Hostetter** and **Stan Gouard** as assistant coaches. Both were key ingredients as players during the 1995 national championship season.

Herdes will begin building his team on the back of senior forward Marlowe Currie (St. Louis, Missouri). Currie, a second team All-GLVC and All-Region performer from a year ago, led the Eagles with 17.0 ppg and 7.6 rpg, both ranking in the top 10 of the GLVC.

Looking to move back into the starting line-up in 2001-02 are junior forward **Diond're Givens** (Mt. Vernon, Indiana) and sophomore forward **Billy Harris** (Carbondale, Illinois). Givens averaged 8.6 ppg and 3.7 rpg in 30 contests a year ago, while Harris hopes to return from a season-ending knee injury.

Harris averaged 8.7 ppg and 3.9 rpg as a freshman in 1999-2000.

Off the bench, senior forward/center **Shirica Shy** (Gordon, Georgia), who picked up 5.3 rpg while averaging 2.9 ppg, will be expected to play a larger role as a senior.

New to the frontcourt this season will be senior forward Ronnie Griffin (Louisville, Kentucky), who is transferring

to USI from the University of Oklahoma. Griffin, who played in 13 games last season for the Sooners, averaged 4.8 ppg and 3.4 rpg and had a season-high 18 points against Coppin State College.

Newcomer Jake Howe (Evansville, Indiana), a freshman from Evansville's Harrison High School, will join Griffin in the frontcourt. Howe averaged 11.8 ppg, 7.0 rpg, and 2.9 blocks per contest for the Warriors last season.

In the backcourt, the Eagles will have one of its toughest challenges, replacing GLVC Player of the Year Derrick Lyons.

Herdes will rely heavily on senior **Wes Attebury** (Evansville, Indiana). Attebury jumped into the starting line-up the final 14 contests of last season and averaged 10.9 ppg, 2.3 ppg better than his 8.6 ppg season average.

Attebury will be joined at the shooting guard position by senior guard Matt Carter (Cannelton, Indiana). Carter, who was six-for-six from beyond the three-point arc against the University of Missouri-St. Louis, averaged 6.5 ppg and 1.1 rpg as a junior.

The two seniors will be joined by freshman guard **Cris Brunson** (Evansville, Indiana), junior guard **David Ragland** (Evansville, Indiana), a transfer from Missouri Southern State College, and junior guard **LaMar Hillsman** (Atlanta, Georgia), a transfer from John A. Logan.

Brunson is coming off an outstanding season at Evansville's Reitz High School where he averaged 25.0 ppg, 6.0 rpg, and 2.4 assists as a senior. Ragland, the Harrison High School graduate who played for MSSC's final four team in 2000, averaged a two-year high 5.7 ppg, 1.5 assists, and 1.8 rpg in 2000-01.

The USI men's basketball team will tip off the 2001-02 regular season on November 16-18 in the Disney Division II Tip-Off Classic at Disney's Wide World of Sports.

USI will play Texas A&M University-Commerce in the first round of the three-day tournament.

The Tip-Off Classic also features Grand Valley State University, in the opposite bracket, and Wingate University, a likely opponent for USI on the second day of the tournament. Both were in the NCAA Division II Tournament last spring.

The last time USI played in the Tip-Off Classic, the Eagles swept three games, including a 134-125 double overtime victory over Northern State University to start 1997-98.

In addition to the classic, the non-conference schedule will feature home contests with Oakland City University on December 15; Abilene Christian University, December 18; Brescia University, December 29; Wilberforce University, January 5; and Olivet Nazarene University, January 31.

The 2001-02 campaign would not be a worthy schedule without the 20 Great Lakes Valley Conference contests. Each year the GLVC schedule is highlighted by the homeand-home series with Kentucky Wesleyan College, the defending national champion on January 3 at the Physical Activities Center and February 23 in Owensboro, Kentucky; and Northern Kentucky University, an NCAA Division II Tournament team on December 8 in Highland Heights, Kentucky, and January 24 at the PAC.

With the departure of Indiana University/Purdue University Ft. Wayne from the GLVC, the Eagles will play a home-and-home schedule with each team in the GLVC, something which has not been done the last two seasons.

The 2001-02 schedule is fan-friendly with a six-game homestand in December and January and a three-game homestand at the end of January.

Men's COACHING STAFF

USI Head Coach Rick Herdes

Head Coach Rick Herdes (Noble, Illinois) enters his first season at the helm of the USI men's basketball program. Herdes is the eighth head basketball coach in the history of the USI program.

Herdes served as former USI Head Coach Bruce Pearl's top assistant coach for nine seasons and is widely known as one of the best recruiters and top coaches in Division II basketball. The Eagles' successes since Herdes' arrival reflect his abilities.

In his nine seasons at USI, Herdes has helped direct the Eagles to a 231-46 overall record (.833), the 1995 NCAA II National Championship, the 1994 NCAA II National Championship game, three Great Lakes Valley Conference Championships, nine consecutive NCAA II Tournament appearances, and nine straight 20-win seasons. USI has averaged over 25 victories a season since 1993-94.

USI's point man on the recruiting trail, Herdes brought in nearly all of the key players, who contributed to USI becoming a national power in Division II. Some of those key recruits were two-time NABC/NCAA Division II Player of the Year Stan Gouard,

All-American and GLVC Player of the Year Chad Gilbert, Division II Bulletin All-American Jeremy Pearson, and 2001 first team All-American Derrick Lyons.

Herdes came to USI from Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville, where he was an assistant from 1986 to 1992. While at SIUE, Herdes helped Head Coach Larry Graham lead the Cougars to a 127-56 (.694) record and three NCAA tournament appearances. He was responsible for coordinating recruiting. He also was the academic advisor to the basketball team

and director of summer camps and fund-raising events.

In 15 collegiate basketball seasons, the programs Herdes has been involved with have a .770 winning percentage (358-102).

In 1991 and 1992 at SIUE, he was the head coach for the Illinois Prairie State Games, Southern Open Men's Division. His 1992 team received the silver medal.

Prior to working at SIUE, Herdes was an assistant basketball coach and physical education instructor at Lawrenceville (Illinois) High School, where he worked for current Indiana University assistant coach Ron Felling. LHS was the Illinois Class A State Champion in 1982 and 1983 and had a 68-game winning streak. Herdes was inducted into the Illinois High School Athletic Association Hall of Fame in 1998.

Herdes graduated from Graceland College in 1980 with a bachelor's degree in education. As a player, he led Lincoln Trail College to a ninth-place finish in the national tournament and helped lead Graceland to its first-ever appearance in the NAIA Tournament.

Herdes has two children—a daughter, Taylor (9), and a son, Connor (6).

Men's COACHING STAFF

MARC HOSTETTER Assistant Coach



Assistant Coach Marc Hostetter (Lyons, Indiana) rejoins the USI men's basketball program after spending two seasons as an assistant coach to Mike Leeder at Longwood College in Virginia. Last season, Hostetter helped lead the Lancers to a 23-8 overall record, their first-ever Carolinas-Virginia Athletic Conference championship, and an NCAA Division II Tournament appearance.

The Lyons, Indiana, native returns to the USI team he helped lead to the 1995 NCAA Division II National Championship and who posted a 105-17 record in four seasons as a point guard. During Hostetter's four seasons, the Screaming Eagles were ranked number

one nationally at some point during the season in three of four seasons.

After his playing days, Hostetter joined the staff of former USI Head Coach Bruce Pearl for two seasons as an assistant coach. During his two seasons on the bench, USI finished as the GLVC Tournament runners-up twice while making a pair of NCAA II Tournament Sweet 16 appearances.

A 1998 USI graduate, Hostetter returns to Indiana with his wife, the former Nikki Jordan.

MARK HINKEY Student Assistant Coach



Mark Hinkey, a junior from Valparaiso, Indiana, has been a men's basketball student assistant coach for the past three years. Hinkey is responsible for monitoring the team's equipment and study halls and mailing out information to prospective junior college and transfer student athletes.

Hinkey is a physical education and health major at USI. He came to USI from Morgan Township High School in Valparaiso, Indiana, where he lettered in baseball.

STAN GOUARD Assistant Coach



Assistant Coach **Stan Gouard** (Danville, Illinois) comes back to his USI basketball roots after spending the last year as a transfer advisor at John A. Logan College in Illinois.

During his three seasons at USI, Gouard was the NABC NCAA Division II Player of the Year and first team All-American in 1995 and 1996 while leading the Screaming Eagles to the 1995 NCAA Division II National Championship; the 1994 NCAA Division II Championship game appearance; and the 1996 NCAA II Great Lakes Regional finals. He was the Chevrolet Player of the Game in 1994 title game for USI when he scored 30 points, 23 in the second half.

Gouard, who averaged 17.2 ppg and 7.9 rpg in 13 NCAA II Tournament games, finished his career at USI ranked third in scoring (1,619 points, 18.8 ppg) and fourth in rebounding (754 rebounds, 7.7 rpg). He shot 62.0 percent from the field (634/1022) and 54.3 percent from beyond the three-point arc (25/46).

While he is remembered as one of USI's dominating offensive performers, Gouard also set the Screaming Eagles records for steals in a game (eight), season (66), and career (176).

After his career at USI, Gouard played outside the United States in Sweden for the Sundsvall Dragons in 1996; in South America for the Barranquilla Ciamanes in 1998; and in Mexico for the Chihuahua Dorados in the summer of 1998. He played for the Des Moines (Iowa) Dragons of the International Basketball Association in 1997.


