

1999-2000 Women's Basketball Outlook

In the fall of 1999, Rick Stein became head women's basketball coach at the University of Southern Indiana.

For the past eight seasons, Stein helped bring women's basketball into the national spotlight as an assistant coach under former head coach Chancellor Dugan. During his tenure, USI has one NCAA Division II National Championship game appearance, four straight NCAA Tournament berths (1995-98), three Great Lakes Valley Conference championships, and a record of 159-73 (.685).

Since Stein became the assistant coach coordinating recruiting and scouting in 1994-95, USI has a record of 119-28, an .809 winning percentage.

In his first season as head coach, Stein will rely heavily upon six veteran players as the Eagles face one of their toughest schedules. With the possibility of playing nine games against teams which competed in the 1999 NCAA Division II Tournament, Stein will depend on two seniors, Jennifer Donner (Wadesville, Indiana), a guard, and Mindy Gingerich (Kokomo, Indiana), a guard/forward, for experience and leadership.

Donner, who is third all-time in career three-point field goals, averaged a career high 7.8 ppg in 31 appearances. She also led the team in free throw percentage, hitting 51 of 65 attempts (.759), and ranks 17th all-time in scoring with 560 career points.

Gingerich came into her own as a junior. A role player her first two seasons, she was third on the team in scoring with a career high 11.1 ppg and 4.5 rpg. She ranked 22nd in scoring and eighth in steals in the GLVC.

Gingerich also needs just 47 steals to break into the top five and 114 rebounds to reach the top 15 all-time at USI.

In the backcourt, the Eagles return junior guard Natalie Glaser (Evansville, Indiana), who caught the attention of GLVC coaches late in the season. Glaser worked her way into the starting line up last season, averaging 9.4 ppg and 4.5 rpg. She also started ten of the team's last 15 games, averaging 13.4 ppg despite an injury which cost her three games.

The leading returning scorer from the 1998-99 squad is sophomore forward Casey Hughes (Bicknell, Indiana).

Hughes, named second team All-GLVC in 1998-99, led the Eagles in scoring with 16.0 ppg and was second in rebounding with 6.0 rpg. She also scored in double figures 26 times in 30 appearances as a freshman, including one stretch of 13 straight.

In the GLVC, Hughes ranked 12th in scoring and 16th in rebounding.

Stein will welcome the return of a junior guard/forward Karrie Hochgesang (St. Anthony, Indiana) and sophomore guard Shavon Sork (Fairfield, Illinois).

Six new faces have been added to the USI roster in 1999-2000, including three transfer players and three freshmen.

The Eagles will be looking for contributions immediately from junior guard/forwards Melinda Cunningham (Bridgeport, Illinois) and Nicole McDaniel (Princeton, Indiana). Cunningham transferred from Vincennes University where she averaged 13.2 ppg and 4.4 rpg, while McDaniel is from Olney Central College, averaging 13.6 ppg, 9.4 rpg, and 3.1 assists last season.

Cunningham also ranked second nationally in the NJCAA in three-point field goal percentage, hitting 51 percent (23-45).

To bolster the frontcourt with some height and experience, the Eagles welcome sophomore center Michelle Irwin (Louisville, Kentucky). She relocates to USI from the University of Louisville where she saw action in 12 contests as a freshman.

Stein also added youth to the team with three freshmen, two from Indiana and one from Illinois.

In the backcourt, the Eagles will look for a contribution from guards Bethany Miller (Princeton, Indiana), Mandy Shaff (Bedford, Indiana), and Carlin Long (Mt. Zion, Illinois).


Miller, who attended Princeton (Indiana) Community High School, and Long, who played for Mt. Zion (Illinois) High School, finished as their school's all-time scoring leaders, while Shaff led Bedford (Indiana) North Lawrence High School in scoring as a senior.

The Eagles will open the Great Lakes Valley Conference season on the road when they travel to Indiana University/Purdue University Ft. Wayne on Thursday, December 2. The Eagles will begin GLVC play at the PAC on Saturday, December 6, hosting Quincy University.

USI will host NCAA Division II Tournament teams Bellarmine College on Thursday, January 20; Southern Illinois University Edwardsville on Tuesday, February 15; and Northern Kentucky University on Saturday, February 26. With the three conference schools and the non-conference schedule (MWSC, TSU, and the University of Nebraska-Kearney), USI could have nine games with teams that played in last year's national tournament.

Women's Coaching Staff

USI Head Coach Rick Stein



Rick Stein begins his first season at the helm of the University of Southern Indiana women's basketball program. An eight-year veteran of the coaching staff, Stein should have no problem steering the Lady Eagles into the path of victory.



Stein, a 1992 USI graduate with a Bachelor of Science degree in business administration, was former Head Coach Chancellor Dugan's graduate assistant, joining the program in 1991-92 after two successful seasons as a player on the Southern Indiana men's team. He was promoted to head assistant coach in 1994, helping Dugan and the Lady Eagles to their best seasons as a varsity sport at USI.

In his eight seasons, Stein helped Dugan amass a 159-63 record with four straight NCAA Division II Tournament appearances (1994-95 to 1997-98) and three Great Lakes Valley Conference titles. The Lady Eagles were the NCAA II Tournament finalist and produced the only perfect season in GLVC history (20-0) in 1997.

Since Stein became the assistant coach coordinating recruiting and scouting in 1994-95, Southern Indiana has a record of 119-28, an .809 winning percentage. A native of Crete, Illinois, Stein began his collegiate basketball career at Parkland College in Champaign, Illinois, earning an associate degree. He continues to work toward a Master of Liberal Studies degree at USI.

Stein and his wife Kari have a son Alex and a daughter Mallorie.



Assistant Coach **LEANN FREELAND**

Former USI student athlete and three time All-American LeAnn Freeland begins her first season as Head Coach Rick Stein's top assistant.

A native of Sims, Illinois, Freeland will assist with recruiting, on-the-court coaching, game scouting, and individual player assessments. She also will continue work on her master's degree at USI in elementary education.

Freeland, a 1997 USI graduate with a bachelor's degree in elementary education, returns to the University after spending the past two years in the Warrick County (Indiana) School Corporation. As a coach, Freeland had a record of 26-3 overall, leading the Castle High School freshman team to a 13-1 record in 1997-98 and Castle Junior High School's eighth grade team to a 13-2 record in 1998-99.

In her four-year career at USI, Freeland was a three-time Women's Basketball Coaches Association/Kodak All-American and a two-time GTE/College Sports Information Directors Academic All-American. She holds the USI career records for scoring (2,269 points), rebounds (961), field goals made (887), and free throws made (738).

The Eagles were 91-24 (.791) during Freeland's four years as a player, including an appearance in the 1997 NCAA Division II Tournament Finals, three NCAA II Tournament berths, and two GLVC titles.

Assistant Coach **RANDA GATLING**


Randa Gatling begins her first season as an assistant coach.

Last year Gatling was an assistant coach under Daria (Weitekamp) Terrell at Central High School in Evansville, Indiana. She also served as head coach for the first-ever Central girl's freshman basketball team and was instrumental in its creation in 1998-99.




A 1999 USI graduate with a bachelor's degree in social work, she works with abused women in the YWCA shelter. She coached an Evansville girls YMCA team in the midnight basketball league and in tournaments at the University of Evansville the previous two summers. Gatling plans to continue her education at USI by pursuing a master's degree in social work.

During her playing days at USI, Gatling, a native of Evansville, Indiana, was a member of the 1997 NCAA Division II Tournament Finalist team, 1995, 1996, 1997, 1998 teams which appeared in the NCAA II Tournament, and the 1995, 1997, and 1998 Great Lakes Valley Conference Championship teams. The Eagles were a dominating 100-16 (.862) during Gatling's four years as a player, including an amazing 67-9 (.881) in the GLVC.





H. Ray Hoops, President


A native of Illinois, H. Ray Hoops received his undergraduate degree from Eastern Illinois University and master's and doctoral degrees in Audiology and Speech Sciences from Purdue University. He also completed an M.B.A. at Moorhead State University.

His career as a scientist and educator has included a faculty appointment jointly at the University of Michigan and Wayne State University. He published extensively and was nationally recognized for his contributions in the areas of rehabilitation of post-surgical patients with cancer of the larynx and in the analysis of language dynamics resulting from brain damage. Among his numerous publications in a variety of behavioral and medical journals was the report on a study which received the National Research Award, the highest honor of the American Speech and Hearing Association. Dr. Hoops also was named Fellow of the Association.

His administrative appointments included the directorship of the Division of Marketing in the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. He received two national service awards for that work. He also was a Senior Fulbright-Hayes Research Scholar in the College of Medicine at the University of the Philippines. Other appointments included dean of the Graduate College of the University of Northern Iowa, associate vice chancellor for Academic Affairs for the Oregon State System of Higher Education, vice president for Academic Affairs at North Dakota State University and president of South Dakota State University.

In the six years prior to becoming the second president of the University of Southern Indiana in 1994, Dr. Hoops served as the vice chancellor for Academic Affairs at the University of Mississippi. While at "Ole Miss," Dr. Hoops received the National Council of State Governments Association Award for his pioneering work on Project '95, a blueprint for the reform of education in the state of Mississippi. He also received the Peterson's Guide Award for contributions to the education of minority students in the innovative and highly successful graduate participation initiative.

Dr. Hoops and his wife Linda, academic marketing leader for the Educational Foundation of the National Restaurant Association, are the parents of a daughter Victoria, an M.B.A. graduate of Ole Miss who is a marketing professional for the trust division of an investment firm in Louisville, Ky.



USI Director of Athletics Steve Newton

Steve Newton, a native of Terre Haute, Indiana, was named the athletic director in 1995.

Named to the NCAA II Great Lakes Regional Advisory Committee in 1997, Newton has brought enthusiasm and pride to the University and the Athletic Department. With an emphasis on community service, he directed the creation of the Eagle Math program for grade school students, the Letterwinners Club, and the Screaming Eagle Scholarship program.

Newton also has placed an emphasis on assisting student athletes to reach their full potential both academically and athletically. To help the student athlete, he has overseen the creation of the extended aid program for fifth-year students.

Prior to taking the position at USI, Newton was serving as an assistant athletic director at the University of South Carolina. He was the head basketball coach at South Carolina from 1991 to 1993.

His duties at South Carolina included serving as the university representative for pre-Olympic preparations for the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta and the South Carolina steering committee for the Olympics.

Newton served as head coach at Murray State University from 1985 to 1991. During his eight seasons as head coach, he was 136-100 (.576). His Murray State team's best run in the NCAA Tournament was in 1988 when it defeated North Carolina State University before losing to eventual national champion University of Kansas, 61-58.

As a head coach, Newton was named the Ohio Valley Conference Coach of the Year in 1988 and 1990; National Association of Basketball Coaches District VII Coach of the Year in 1988; and led Murray State to four consecutive Ohio Valley Conference championships and post-season tournament appearances, 1988-91.

Newton received a bachelor's degree in physical education and master's in education from Indiana State University. He was named a member of the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame Silver Anniversary team in 1984. Newton and his wife Kathy have four children—daughter LeAyer, and sons Harv, Jay, and Royce.

Residence Life

Location. Founded in 1965, the University of Southern Indiana is located in Evansville, the state's third largest city. From its picturesque site on the Ohio River, Evansville is a comfortable drive from the major metropolitan areas of Indianapolis, Cincinnati, Louisville, Nashville, and St. Louis.

Academic Life. The University enrolls nearly 8,700 students and offers undergraduate majors in 60 areas of study. Several graduate degree programs also are available.
