Mayor McDonald to be USI Commencement speaker

City of Evansville Mayor Frank F. McDonald II will be the speaker for USI's 1999 Commencement, to be held at 7 p.m. Saturday, May 8, at Roberts Stadium. Mayor McDonald, a 1973 USI graduate, is serving his third elected term as mayor and will receive an honorary Doctor of Laws in recognition for his service to the people of Evansville and southwestern Indiana. He followed his father Frank F. McDonald, former three-term Evansville mayor, into politics in 1987. The elder McDonald received an honorary doctorate from the University during dedication of the campus in 1970 for his leadership in establishing the campus.

Honorary doctorates also will be conferred upon civic leaders Dr. Edward L. Brundick Jr., Evansville orthopedic surgeon who has served as USI's team physician for 25 years; and James J. Giancola, president and chief executive officer of CNBBancshares, Inc. and chair of Campaign USI.

Approximately 1,330 students will be eligible to receive master's, bachelor's, and associate degrees at the ceremony, including eight who will graduate summa cum laude with perfect 4.0 grade point averages, 49 who will graduate magna cum laude, and 68 who will graduate cum laude.

The summa cum laude graduates are occupational therapy major **Ms. Laura Mae Bengert** of Evansville; health services major **Ms. Rebecca N. Dicus** of Mount Carmel; business administration major **Ms. Cheryl J. Gaither** of Montgomery; history major **Mr. Dain L. Garrett** of Carmi, Illinois; accounting major **Ms. Tonya F. Kirkland** of Dale; accounting major **Ms. Katy M. Powell** of Converse; and occupational therapy major **Ms. Kimberly L. Tremper** of Chandler.

Other special honors at the 1999 Commencement include awarding the National City Bank Distinguished Professor Award to **Dr. Oscar Ozete**, professor of Spanish; and the President's Medal to **Ms. MaryBeth Cable**, a communications major active in numerous student organizations.

Mr. Gary E. May, associate professor of social work, testified in April before the U.S. Senate Judiciary Committee concerning the proposed Constitutional amendment banning flag desecration. Congress tried to outlaw flag desecration in 1989, but the U.S. Supreme Court struck down the Flag Protection Act, which 91 senators supported, as unconstitutional. The new amendment would reverse that decision. Mr. May told the Senate that amending the Constitution to prohibit physical desecration of the flag would undermine the very rights and freedoms he and other veterans fought to safeguard.

Mr. John McNaughton, professor of art, and **Dr. Nadine Coudret**, dean of the School of Nursing and Health Professions, received Celebration of Leadership Awards from Leadership Evansville this spring. Nominated by Pigeon Creek Greenway Passage board member **Ms. Shirley James**, Mr. McNaughton was recognized as an Overall Division Winner for his leadership in directing students to develop art for the Pigeon Creek Greenway Passage. USI art students constructed three sculptures for the Greenway in a summer arts program. Dr. Coudret, nominated by the School of Nursing and Health Professions staff and faculty, was an Individual Division Winner for her work in improving health care in the community through development of programs in the USI School of Nursing and Health Professions.
