ACS CHAPTER RECEIVES SPECIAL RECOGNITION. The ISUE Student Chapter of the American Chemical Society has received special recognition for an excellent year. Of the 652 student chapters of ACS only eighty-six were given this special award. The American Chemical Society helps students interested in chemistry develop attitudes of professionalism. **HOWARD DUNN**, Associate Professor of Chemistry, serves as faculty advisor to the ISUE chapter.

EIGHT BALL TOURNAMENT JANUARY 29 AND 30. Persons of all ages can register for the Amateur 8-ball tournament scheduled at ISUE on January 29 and 30. Champion billiard player Nick Varner, Jr. will serve as referee of the tournament. He will also perform billiard exhibitions at 7:00 p.m. both nights of the tournament.

The tournament will be played double elimination, best two out of three. Five divisions will be offered: Amateur Open, 17 years of age and under; Amateur Open, 18 years of age and older; Amateur Women's, 17 and under; Amateur Women's, 18 and over and Amateur Senior Open, 55 and over.

Persons can register throughout the day and evening on January 28, 1977 and the morning of January 29. The registration fee is \$3.00 per event. The tournament will be held in the Recreation Room of the University Center.

ANNUAL MEETING. The Indiana State University Credit Union will hold its annual meeting in the Reeve Hall Conference Center, Pine Room, at 7:00 p.m. February 3 on the Terre Haute Campus. Annual reports will be given.

CHEERLEADING COMPETITION. All area high school and grade school cheerleaders are invited to a competition and clinic at the ISUE Arena on February 5. Registration is from 11:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon. Competition will take place from 12:00 noon to 3:00 p.m. with the clinic to follow from 3:00 to 6:00 p.m. An awards presentation will be held at 6:00 p.m.

ART CLASS TO EXHIBIT PAINTINGS. Art students will be displaying their original works in the Engineering Technology Building beginning February 25. **JACK CASCIONE**, Assistant Professor of Art, will be directing the display.

ISUE FILM SERIES. "Paths of Glory" starring Kirk Douglas, Ralph Meeker, Adolphe Menjou, and George Macready will be showing in Room A126 at 2:00 and 8:00 p.m. on Thursday, January 27.

"Paths of Glory" is a prime artistic monument to the anti-human quality of war, and is one of the most savage, most stunning, and most moving studies of men in armed conflict yet to be recorded on film. Kirk Douglas plays a French criminal lawyer, a man of peace, who has answered his nation's call in World War I and is placed in command of a regiment. The commanding general orders Douglas to launch a clearly suicidal attack, and then attempts to fire on his own men when the offensive's inevitable failure occurs. "Paths of Glory" is directed by Stanley Kubrick.

NON-CREDIT CLASSES REPEATED. The non-credit class, Growing Plants Indoors, is being repeated in the winter series. Greenhouse Manager Teresa Manger will teach this general study course of plants including selection, potting soil mixtures, care, use of insecticides, and propagation. Exotic houseplants as well as the more common varieties will be covered. The course will be offered on eight Thursdays, beginning February 3. The class will meet from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. The registration fee is \$25.

Also for persons seeking help in learning more efficient studying skills, the non-credit class in Efficient Studying Techniques is being repeated. The course will begin with an individual assessment of each participant's current approach to studying, and continue with suggestions and practice in improving study methods. Peg Clemens, a reading and study skills specialist at the Tell City schools, will teach the course for eight Wednesdays beginning January 26 from 6:30 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. The registration fee is \$25.

HUMANITIES FORUM. DAVID KINSEY, Assistant Professor of Mathematics, will be the featured speaker in the weekly Humanities Forum on January 27. DR. KINSEY will discuss "How Large is Infinity?" He will explore the question of where one "ends" when one starts counting leads to the concept of infinity. DR. KINSEY will answer the question by showing that our common concept of infinity is in fact a small one - flavored with a historical description of how infinity has been interpreted mathematically. The discussion, which is open to the public, will be held in the Rare Books Room of the Library from 11:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon.

MAGIC AND COMEDY. At 12:00 noon today, John Fabjance, a magician and comedian, will present a teaser in Pyramid Lounge of University Center. Fabjance is the inventor of over 100 magic tricks distributed worldwide and has designed trick props for professional shows. The master performance will be given in A126 at 8:00 p.m.

Fabjance tricks are being used in Broadway's hit musical "Pippin", the 1977 production of Ice Capades, and in Ringling Brothers Barnum and Bailey Circus. He has performed at Six Flags Over Mid America and on numerous college campuses.

His appearance at ISUE is sponsored by the Student Union Board.

EMPLOYEE PORTRAIT. "Hey there good buddy, this is Blue Dart; come on, come on." The handle "Blue Dart" does not describe his color or acceleration, explains *JIM BAUMEYER* of *ISUE*; it simply means that at the time he purchased his citizens band radio he was driving a blue Dart.

BAUMEYER enjoys his hobbies because as he puts it, "You get to know a lot of different people and there's a storehouse of knowledge in every hobby."

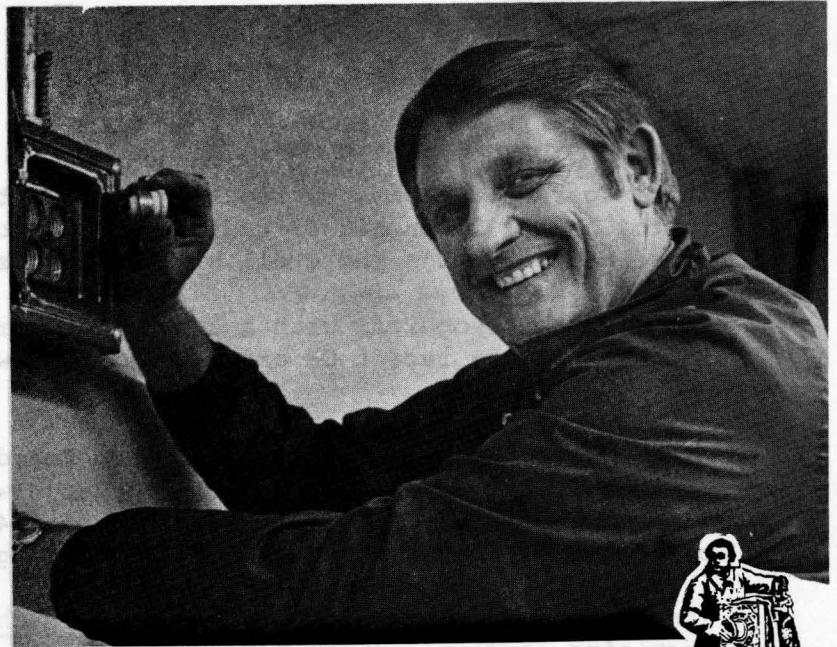
Before clocks, it was antique automobiles. *BAUMEYER* was a member of the Old Time Auto Club in Evansville and rebuilt three Model A Fords. With this experience as background he is presently stripping down a Volkswagon to construct a dune buggy. When finished he will switch from motorcycle to dune buggy in the Hadi Shrine parades. The dune buggy will be built of deep yellow fiberglass with lots of shiny chrome.

BAUMEYER, a Reitz graduate, is an Evansville native. He met his wife Mary in the emergency room at Deaconess Hospital where she was a nurse. *BAUMEYER* was an accident investigator with the Evansville police force at that time. They were married December 31, 1951 and celebrated their 25th Wedding Anniversary this New Year's Eve. They are the parents of two daughters.

When he served an electrician's apprenticeship at *Servel* in the late 1940s, *BAUMEYER* expected to become and remain an electrician. Little did he realize this expectation would come true only after the completion of a 20-year career with the Evansville police force. Following his retirement in 1969, *Baumeyer* was employed by *ISUE* as a journeyman electrician. He will have completed seven years of service in June.

JIM BAUMEYER is a life member of the Fraternal Order of Police. He is past president of that organization and has been a member of the board for seventeen years. He has also served as a member of the board of the FOP for the state of Indiana for two years. Other organizations to which he belongs are the Great Lake Shrine Association, Masonic Blue Lodge, Scottish Rite, Hadi Shrine, Veterans of Foreign War #1114, Retired Police and Firemen's Association, Royal Order of the Moose and St. Paul's Lutheran Church.
