UNIVERSITY MEETING JANUARY 6. The Spring semester University meeting for faculty and administrative staff will be held Monday, January 6, in Forum II. The session will start with coffee and donuts at 8:15 a.m.; introductions and announcements at 8:45 will be followed at 9 a.m. by a presentation by **Ms. Kathy Taylor** of Longwood College on "Cognitive Development Research and Its Applications to Teaching and Learning." The meeting will conclude with a noon lunch.

"TALENT SEARCH" AT HISTORIC NEW HARMONY. A search for anyone in the area with talents in early 19th Century crafts is being conducted by Historic New Harmony, Inc., for use in projects involving elementary school children. Talent is needed in the areas of: the making of butter, cheese, jam, jelly, kraut, bread, shoes, pottery (red clay), candles (dipping), brooms, baskets, and lye soap; vegetable dyeing or canning; cold-pack meat canning; sheep shearing; tinsmithing or blacksmithing; stitchery (candle wicking, sampler, tatting); chair caning; tole painting; silhouette cutting; apiarist (bee keeper); black powder guns; musical instruments (harpsichord, dulcimer, etc.); dried fruits, vegetables, herbs, and flowers; or any other craft of the period.
