State Math Contest April 20 at USI

The 1996 Indiana State Mathematics Contest will be held Saturday, April 20, at USI, one of 14 sites for the statewide competition. Around 155 students from 11 southern Indiana high schools and middle schools are expected to participate in algebra I and II, geometry, or comprehensive competition.

The competition, sponsored by the Indiana Council of Teachers of Mathematics, will start at 9:30 a.m. in Forum I. Scholar certificates are awarded to top local scorers and Outstanding Scholar certificates are awarded to top state scorers who also will be recognized at an awards ceremony in Indianapolis.

At USI, students may also enter the Math-O-Rama, a round-robin tournament in which they pair off to attack a series of recreational math problems.

SGA plans spruce up, start of Safe Ride

The Student Government Association has two major events slated in late April, one enlisting students in campus improvements and the second providing assistance to students in emergency situations.

The campus improvement on Sunday, April 21, will start at 8 a.m. with landscaping around the new apartment units in McDonald West and branch out to O'Daniel and the main campus, time and materials permitting.

Ms. Debbie Duren, SGA president, said at mid-week she has 160 student volunteers signed up to assist with planting the trees and shrubs and applying mulch that will be supplied by the Physical Plant. She said they can use assistance with equipment, however -- wheelbarrows, shovels, rakes, hoses, and brooms. Additional volunteers will be welcomed, also.

Mr. Donald Fleming, grounds supervisor, said they have some equipment to help out but not enough to equip 160-plus volunteers. He suggests that perhaps volunteers can bring their own shovels and rakes. If anyone in the campus community has equipment to loan out, it would be appreciated.

The Safe Ride program will be initiated via a

press conference at 11 a.m. Thursday, April 25, on the UC Mall. USI President H. Ray Hoops will make the official announcement. Also on hand will be Mr. Derek Dillon, owner of Yellow Cab Company, which will participate in Safe Ride.

Ms. Duren said they are initiating the program because they have found local companies are interested in participating, but want the program in place first.

Safe Ride is intended to aid students caught up in an emergency without financial ability to escape. Anyone needing to get away from a situation involving drugs, alcohol, or physical abuse, for example, will be able to call a taxicab. The cab driver will supply a voucher to be signed by the student and paid by the University.

Ms. Duren stresses that this is assistance in an emergency and students should be aware that they ultimately must reimburse the University for the ride home or wherever they need to go, thus creating a revolving fund to keep the program available to students in future emergencies.
