CURRICULAR COMMITTEE. In the February 19 Curricular Committee meeting, a new course petition was returned to

the Communications Department because the course currently is being taught as an X course on which paperwork has never been approved. The department has been instructed to submit a petition for the X course first, then return the original new course petition. **In order for a new course to be taught, the petition must be received by the Curricular Committee on or before the first day of the preceding semester.** A Communications Department program modification petition also was returned because it was on the wrong form. Hopefully, all of the communications courses and the program modification can be acted upon at the next meeting on Friday, March 2, in L100.

Several petitions from the School of Business were presented and the committee voted to return them, since the date of approval was November 1987. The committee felt the forms should be signed by the school's current faculty and administration.

The committee also approved a motion that a memo be sent to **Dr. Robert L. Reid**, vice president for Academic Affairs, requesting the designation of a person in his office to receive and process all curriculum petitions and that an ongoing record be maintained.

The committee agreed to a request from **Dr. Robert E. Mays**, chair of the Teacher Education Department, to delay consideration of EDUC 211 Educational Applications of Logo until the next meeting.

The following program modification has been received: replace TECH 141 Statics - 3 hours with TECH 342 Mechanics for Electrical Engineering Technology - 4 hours; eliminate the general elective; change a Humanities elective from second semester, junior year, to second semester, senior year.

18 ARTISTS TO BE FEATURED AT NEW HARMONY

Functional and non-functional sculpture by 18 artists from around the United States will be shown in "Furnishing Art," the next exhibition at the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art. The exhibition will open with a reception for the artists from 1 to 4 p.m. on Sunday, March 11, and continue through April 14. The reception is free and open to the public.

Curator for the exhibition will be **Mr. Paul Sasso**, a professor of art at Murray State College in Kentucky. He also will present a free public lecture at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, March 21, in The Athenaeum at New Harmony in which he will show furniture related to his work.
