PROSPECTIVE STUDENT AND PARENT DAYS. The first two of four Prospective Student and Parent Days are scheduled on October 23 and October 24 at ISUE. Prospective Student and Parent Days are designed to acquaint high school juniors, seniors, and their parents with college life, and in particular, a college career at ISUE. A regular Prospective Student and Parent Day will include a morning session with the Chairman of each Division discussing course requirements and career opportunities in their area, a tour of the campus, lunch provided for the students and parents, and a short afternoon meeting on admission requirements, costs, and financial aid. The sessions are open to high school juniors and seniors and their parents. The Prospective Student and Parent Days are sponsored by the Admissions Office.

HUMANITIES FORUM. "No Smoking, People Are Trying to Breathe" is the topic of the October 24 Forum by Kenneth Vance, Assistant Professor of Communications. Mr. Vance will emphasize the need for protecting non-smokers in view of the increasing scientific evidence which indicates that being forced to breathe tobacco smoke is indeed harmful to health. The University's role regarding this preventative health question will be raised and suggestions will be offered as to what one can do to remedy America's top air pollution problem, smoking. ISUE Professor of Geology/Geography, Frank Stanonis, and the President of the local chapter of Indiana Civil Liberties Union, Charles Berger, will be the next two featured speakers in the ISUE sponsored American Issues class offered each Wednesday. COLLEGE NIGHT. College Night, a program for high school juniors and seniors and their parents who are interested in information about all phases of college life, will be held on October 29, 1975 at 7:30 p.m. at Indiana State University Evansville. College Night is sponsored by the Evansville-Vanderburgh School Corporation.

College representatives from approximately 40 institutions of higher education are expected to participate in College Night this year. College representatives provide information about admission procedures, campus housing, academic standards, student life and financial aid for their particular institution. Six states will be sending college representatives to College Night. Those states are Colorado, Tennessee, Indiana, Illinois, Kentucky, and Missouri.

Junior and senior college bound students from all Evansville high schools and area high schools will meet with college representatives in three separate 35 minute sessions. The first session will begin at 7:30 p.m. Harold Calloway, ISUE Financial Aids Director, and James Dawson, U of E Financial Aids Director, will conduct three sessions on the different aspects of financial aid available to college students in Room A126 during College Night.

UE - ISUE CONFERENCE. The University of Evansville and Indiana State University Evansville will host the Region 9 Conference of the Association of College Unions-International on October 31, November 1 and 2, 1975. The theme of this year's conference is "Come Alive in 75." Conference delegates will attend workshop sessions in many areas, including Outdoor Education, which will be featured on the ISUE campus Saturday, November 1, 1975 at 3:30 p.m. The Conference delegates will be dressed in jeans and complementary "Grubbies," ready for high adventure. All Adventure Education activities are group ones, involving problem solving and trust in other group-interaction. These activities are designed to awaken self-awareness and self-in-group awareness. They provide a chance for delegates to interact, to react to challenges, and to realize a group reaction.

That evening, Saga Food Service will cater a barbecue on the University Center Mall, followed by a square dance. Colleges and universities from Indiana, Illinois, and Tennessee will be represented, as well as a variety of program oriented exhibitors which will enhance the two day conference.

ALUMINUM CANS TO BE RECYCLED. On Saturday, November 1, the Aluminum Company of America, Newburgh, will open an aluminum can collection center at Warrick Operations. The center will be open from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. each Saturday. Through this program, the Aluminum Company of America will be buying empty all-aluminum cans from the public for 15 cents a pound. All-aluminum cans do not have a side seam, have a rounded bottom and are non-magnetic. The cans collected at Warrick each Saturday will be processed locally, melted and converted into more aluminum can sheet.

ALUMINUM CANS TO BE RECYCLED, CONTINUED. Aluminum is the most valuable material found in any significant quantity in our waste stream. Its scrap value is about ten times the salvage of any other packaging material. In addition, aluminum can be recycled time and time again since it does not deteriorate. The benefits of aluminum can recycling are significant. Litter is reduced and solid waste disposal is simplified. Also, people will benefit financially from their ecological efforts...a good program for either individual or group efforts.

CIVIL LIBERTIES AND CRIME CONTROL FORUMS. A series of public forums dealing with the desired balance between civil liberties and necessary crime control will be held in the Old Court House Building November 4, 11, 18, and 25. The historical evolution of Constitutional freedoms and various bills pending in the U.S. Congress dealing with civil liberties and crime control will be considered.

A \$1,600 grant from the Indiana Committee for the Humanities has been awarded to the project, which is sponsored by Indiana State University Evansville, Public Action in Correctional Effort, and the Southwestern Indiana Civil Liberties Union. *Walter Hopkins, Associate Professor of Sociology, is project director.*

INDIANA H.E.W. CONFERENCE. The Indiana H.E.W. Conference will be held on November 5, 6, and 7 at the Executive Inn. All Project Directors and their staffs are asked to attend. Two basic questions which will be focused on throughout the Conference are:

- 1) What are you doing to foster school desegregation?
- 2) What are you doing to foster equal educational opportunity?

HISTORIC COMMUNAL SOCIETIES CONFERENCE. The Historic Communal Societies Conference will be held on November 6, 7 and 8 at Kentucky's restored Shaker Village at Pleasant Hill. The Conference is being sponsored by the Interim Committee on Historic Communal Cooperation, the History Department at Indiana State University Evansville, and Shakertown at Pleasant Hill, Inc.

The purpose of the Conference is to establish communication and cooperation among those who are studying, restoring and preserving historic communes. The Conference aids the development of historic communal sites by the dissemination of information regarding funding, physical restoration and preservation, and the interpretation of these communities to the public. In addition to its annual meeting, the Conference intends to stimulate interest in communal societies through publications, tourist information and the collection of archival material. All who are interested in the many contributions of historic communal societies to the American heritage are invited to attend and participate in the Conference. SECRETARIES OF ISUE SELLING BICENTENNIAL MEDALLIONS. Quality keepsakes of the Bicentennial are being sold by the Secretaries of ISUE to raise money for 1976 scholarships. The keepsake is an antique solid bronze coin designed in pendants and key chains. Each coin is individually registered with its own number and a certificate of registration is enclosed with each coin. The certificate of registration is to be returned by the customer to the Commemorative Mint. The registration feature is usually found only in more costly sterling silver and gold coins.

According to *Mrs. Judy Beck*, Co-Chairman of the Special Projects Committee of the Secretaries of ISUE, "Persons want to be a part of the Bicentennial, we have found. They want to become involved in making this celebration just as important today as it was almost 200 years ago. The Bicentennial coin can be passed on for generations to come, saying, 'I celebrated the Bicentennial.'" *Mrs. Alma LaFontaine* is also serving as Co-Chairman of the Project, and she explained that the coins are on sale at ISUE.
