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SIGECO LIFTS ENERGY RESTRICTIONS. Southern Indiana Gas and Electric Company has announced the lifting of restrictions in the use of electric power. ISUE will continue to use prudent judgement to conserve energy and dollars; however, certain restrictions are being eliminated and/or eased. APPOINTMENT. ANN PADBERG, a native of St. Louis, Missouri, has been appointed Director of Development at ISUE. Her appointment was approved by the ISU Board of Trustees at an April 7 meeting in Terre Haute.

Miss Padberg comes to ISUE from the Villa Duchesne/Oak Hill School in St. Louis. At Villa/Oak Hill, an independent secondary school, Miss Padberg was Director of Development and Public Relations. In this capacity, she worked closely with the members of the Development Committee of the Board of Trustees and was responsible for the school's annual fund drive. She also handled public information for the school and was editor of the school's alumni publication.

Previously Miss Padberg worked in the publishing field where she gained experience in writing, design and production. She was with Allyn and Bacon, Inc. of Boston, Massachusetts and with Boston Research Company. In both posts, she was an editor and engaged in research. She also was an editor and production specialist with Camrel, Inc., a national educational laboratory in St. Louis. Miss Padberg has teaching experience at both the secondary and elementary levels from schools in Ft. Madison, Iowa and St. Louis, Missouri.

Miss Padberg holds the B.A. degree from Notre Dame College in St. Louis and has taken additional study at St. Louis University and the University of Missouri at St. Louis.

CREDIT UNION HIGHLIGHTS. A statement of the financial growth of the ISU Federal Credit Union was reported at the 18th annual meeting held January 25, 1978. Assets were reported to be \$5,438,816.51, a growth of \$1,140,877.57 in one year. Membership now totals 3,124. Dividends paid during 1977 at 6.25 APR compounded quarterly amounted to \$277,957.33.

The present annual dividend rate of 6.50% compounded quarterly is effective on dividends paid on March 31, 1978. This is an increase of .25%. The Credit Union also offers:

- free life insurance matching your share dollars up to \$2,000 per account
- dividends are paid on deposits made by the 10th of the month
- all accounts are federally guaranteed up to \$40,000

"INTERPERSONAL COMMUNICATION: THE SEARCH FOR REALISTIC INTIMACY". ISUE will have a one-night workshop "Interpersonal Communication: The Search for Realistic Intimacy" Tuesday, April 18 at 6:30 p.m. in L105.

The session will explore the concepts and techniques that facilitate positive male-female communication. Participants will examine an overview of communications, the levels of communications, and the conditions and needs that contribute to effective interpersonal relationships.

Workshop leaders will be DR. HELEN SANDS, Associate Professor of Communications, who will discuss "Levels of Communications" and the conditions for trust and respect; BRAD AWE, Instructor in Communications, who will present an "Overview of Communications and Communication Skills" and REVEREND BERNARD LUTZ, Director of Campus Ministry, who will discuss "The Ethical Dimensions of Regular Communication Skills." SISTER SHELIA GRIFFIN, Campus Ministry Counselor, will introduce the speakers and moderate the discussion. Following the hour input by the speakers, exercise models will be used to allow participants to react to the sessions.
