NATIVE AMERICANS TO BE DINNER TOPIC


Dr. R. David Edmunds, educator and author of several books and articles on native Americans, will be the featured speaker at a dinner in the New Harmony Inn Conference Center on Friday, November 22, co-sponsored by Harmonie Associates and Historic New Harmony Society. His topic will be "The American Indian Odyssey."

Dr. Edmunds is professor of history at Indiana University. His books include *The Shawnee Prophet*, published in 1983, nominated for a Pulitzer Prize, recipient of the Ohioan Prize for Biography, and selected for the History Book Club; *The Potawatomis, Keepers of the Fire*, awarded the 1978 Francis Parkman Prize in American History; and *Tecumseh and the Quest for Indian Leadership*.

Dr. Edmunds has degrees from Millikin, Illinois State, and Oklahoma universities. He also has taught at the University of Wyoming and Texas Christian University, and has been involved in many projects focusing on the American Indiana. Dr. Edmunds has been a consultant to numerous agencies November 7, in the USI Technology Building. All programs are free and open to the public. For information, contact the Gallery, 682-3156.

Mr. Aurbach received an M.F.A. in sculpture from Southern Methodist University in 1982. He was awarded a Tennessee Arts Commission Fellowship in 1990 and is represented by Bernice Steinbaum Gallery in New York. In his "Final Portrait" sculpture series, Mr. Aurbach shifts the context of common objects and symbols to create new meanings. The early works in the series function as symbolic portraits of workers (mail carriers, carpenters, bricklayers) by creating funeral caskets customized to the particular occupation.


