"Is Censorship Justified? When?" will be the topic for the second community panel at 7 p.m. today (Wednesday) in the Evansville Courier Community Room, preparing for the visit March 26-27 of the 1992 Enlow Distinguished Scholar, **Mr. Anthony Jones**, president of the School of the Art Institute of Chicago.

Dr. David W. Drebushenko, USI assistant professor of philosophy, will moderate a panel made up of **Mr. Paul McAuliffe**, executive director, Evansville Courier Company; **Rabbi Arthur Abrams** of Adath B'nai Israel Temple; **Mr. Michael Lee Gradison**, American Civil Liberties Union in Indiana; and **Mr. Robert Pigman**, former Vanderburgh County prosecutor.

They will discuss the right to assemble and public safety, hate crimes and speech, national security and the First Amendment, and freedom of the press. The public is invited.

March is the month for ISTEP (Indiana Statewide Testing for Education Progress) in grades six and eight. Test dates are March 9-18. Parents can be of special help during test time in the following ways:

- * Encourage children to take the tests seriously; scores are used to place a student in classes and definitely affect the future.
- * Require children to go to bed early on nights before tests.
- * Making up a test is not an ideal way to score well -- make sure your children are in school on test day, unless they are ill or there is a family emergency.
- * Ask your children about the tests during this time period.

The test measures achievement in reading, English, math, social studies, and science. Test results are mailed to parents in May and are not always easy to understand. Please call the school if you need further explanation; educators want to help. Students who score below the state cutoff are required to attend summer school and retake the test before they can be promoted to the next grade. If your child needs to attend summer school, please support the summer program.
