## "ALWAYS A RIVER"

The "Always a River" exhibit is slated to dock at Evansville on Thursday, August 15, and remain here through Sunday, August 18. The exhibit is interactive, with visitors able to experience the story of the Ohio River. The barge also will be at Henderson, Kentucky, August 20-21, and Mt. Vernon, Indiana, August 23-24. The exhibit will close Labor Day weekend, September 2-8, at Cairo, Illinois.

Evansville Center City Corporation is coordinating barge events and has planned a three-day riverfront celebration during the time the barge is docked here.

The opening ceremony at 9 a.m. Friday, August 16, will conclude with an *Always a River* book signing by Dr. Robert L. Reid, USI vice president for Academic Affairs who edited the book which accompanies the exhibit. At 9:30 a.m., Mr. Bill Hendrickson, former USI sports information director, will do his Mark Twain presentation on the main stage. At 12 noon, the *Young Abe Lincoln* cast will do a presentation and at 5:30 p.m., Mrs. Lori Clouser, executive director of the Evansville Arts Council and a USI graduate, will present early American music. The main event

that evening will be the Temple Airs Big Band Dance from 8 to 10 p.m. Food booths will be available throughout the barge stay.

The exhibit will open at 10 a.m. Saturday and Sunday, August 17-18. Saturday's special events will include music, storytelling, and the main event at 7 p.m., Ohio River songs by Mr. Saul Broudy and Mr. Dillon Bustin. Sunday's events will include music and dancing, with everything closing at 6 p.m.

"Always A River: The Ohio River and the American Experience," is sponsored by the humanities councils of Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia, and supported by a \$175,000 Exemplary Award grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities.

The project focuses on the way the river has shaped the personal experiences, commercial life, technological development, settlement patterns, and artistic vision of the people of its region. Inextricably linked to this is a consideration of how the people have changed and shaped the river and related to the primal natural forces which give it its special character and power.

**HUMANITIES WORKSHOPS.** "Integrating the Humanities in the Evansville Area" will be the theme for a series of humanities workshops August 22-24, a program funded by the Lilly Endowment through USI's Extended University Program.

The program is being coordinated by Dr. John H. Gottcent, USI professor of English, who said it is designed to open and enhance lines of communication between area high schools, colleges, and the arts community. Twenty area educators and representatives of local arts organizations will participate, coming from the Evansville-Vanderburgh School Corporation, Evansville Day School, area Catholic schools, University of Evansville, USI, Evansville Museum of Arts and Science, Evansville Philharmonic Orchestra, The New Harmony Theatre, and the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art.

The group will spend a day in New Harmony and a day at the Evansville Museum, with opening and closing dinners/panel discussions to be held at USI. Participants will share what they do now and what they might do in the future to assist one another in enhancing education and experience in the humanities and the arts. Ideas are to be taken back to home institutions for implementation. A follow-up gathering in December will assess the project's impact and plan its development as an annual event.

Special workshop features will include a visit to the "Always a River" barge exhibit at Mt. Vernon, a performance of *Cat on a Hot Tin Roof* at The New Harmony Theatre, and a special musical performance by an ensemble from the Philharmonic.

Other USI participants will be Dr. James R. Blevins, dean of the School of Liberal Arts and producer of The New Harmony Theatre; Dr. Guillermo Latorre, assistant professor of Spanish; Mrs. Phyllis A. Toy, instructor in English; Mr. Curt Uebelhor, exhibits preparator at the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art; and Mr. Eric L. vonFuhrmann, assistant professor of English.
