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ISUE RECEIVES GOVERNOR'S AWARD. ISUE was named the recipient of the Governor's Award at the Evansville State Hospital's Recognition Program on Monday evening, May 17. The award was bestowed in honor of ISUE's promotion of volunteer work in the community and for its continuing relationship with the Evansville State Hospital and the Evansville Psychiatric Children's Center in providing concerned volunteers. *Daniel Miller*, Chairman,

Division of Social Science and Professor of History, and *Susan Donaldson*, Associate Professor of Psychology, were present to accept the award.

BRECKINRIDGE CABIN DEDICATED. A cabin just west of the Westwood Lodge has been renovated and was dedicated and named in a brief ceremony on Thursday, May 20, 1976. Named the Breckinridge Cabin, in honor of the members of the Breckinridge Job Corps who made renovation possible, it will be used for field trips, scout outings, and science classes. Westwood Garden Club undertook the cabin as a project after the successful renovation of Westwood Lodge, a larger cabin restored by members of the Garden Club.

The 40-year old cabin was renovated by an intermediate carpentry class from the Job Corps. Plans for the renovation of the cabin were drawn by Marshall Arnold, the Breckinridge carpentry class instructor. The original timbers were used in the restoration as much as possible.

Doris Eicher, project chairman for the Westwood Garden Club, commented on the plans for the cabin. "I think it can be used as an observation place for nature study and a meeting place for talking and understanding the outdoor environment."

The cabin took approximately three years to complete, with over 200 Job Corps men working on the project in that time. The cabin adds a useful dimension to the Westwood Lodge area. Persons are welcome to explore the area at their convenience.

SUMMER NONCREDIT COURSES. Techniques for Efficient Studying will be a new noncredit course offered by the Office of Continuing Education for the 1976 summer series. According to *Ed Jones*, Director of Continuing Education, the course has been developed for three groups of people: incoming college freshmen, current students in need of better study skills, and adults considering re-entry into education and wanting refreshment in study skills.

The course will be offered five Tuesdays and Thursdays, June 15 through July 15, from 7:00-9:00 p.m. in L107, and will cover time management, listening to lectures, note-taking, textbook reading, skimming and scanning, and test-taking. Other topics to be included are some special tips on psyching out professors, preparing psychologically for higher education, and generally learning how to survive in college.



SUMMER NONCREDIT COURSES, CONTINUED. The instructors for the course are Peg Clemens, Reading and Study Skills Specialist of the Tell City Schools, and Tim Buecher, Director of Counseling. The cost for the course is \$30.00, which includes all materials to be used in the course.

Two ceramics workshops will also be offered this summer in the noncredit series of classes. The workshops will be comprehensive programs in high fire ceramics and will be taught by Melody Lewis, the 1975 Children's Art Fair Chairman and Art Instructor in Posey County Elementary Schools. One workshop will be offered for junior and senior high school students on four Tuesdays and Thursdays, June 8 through July 1, from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon at the Art Center. The second workshop will be for adults and will also be offered on four Tuesdays and Thursdays, June 8 through July 1, from 6:00-9:00 p.m. at the Art Center.

Students will work primarily in stoneware, learning the basic handbuilding methods. Instruction will include working on the potter's wheel. Students with previous experience in clay will be given advanced instruction. Completed work will be fired in stoneware and salt kilns, giving students a basic understanding of firing procedures. Primitive pit or sawdust firing will be included if there is sufficient student interest.

The cost for the course is \$35.00, which includes all materials to be used in the course.

Other noncredit courses being offered this summer include Summer Sailing Course, scheduled to begin June 14; Small Engine Repair Class, June 8; and Introduction to Football Officiating, July 20. Further details on each course are available in the Office of Continuing Education, Ext. 363.

1976-77 BASKETBALL SCHEDULE RELEASED. The 1976-77 basketball schedule was released last week by Coach Wayne Boultinghouse. The twenty-seven game schedule includes two tournaments along with dates with Division I powers, Western Michigan and Toledo, and former NCAA Champion, Roanoke. Tennessee State, Western Illinois, Bellarmine, Franklin and Roanoke will provide the Eagles with an attractive 13-game home schedule.

1976-77 BASKETBALL SCHEDULE RELEASED, CONTINUED, ISUE will host the first annual River City Tip-Off Classic on November 26 and 27. Participating teams include Oakland City, Missouri Baptist and St. Francis. The pairings for the River City Classic will be drawn on Flag Day, June 14.

The Eagles will be one of the four team field participating in the All-American Tourney at Owensboro, Kentucky on December 15 and 16. Host Kentucky Wesleyan, ISUE, Tennessee Wesleyan and former NAIA Champion, West Georgia, complete the field.

Teams appearing on the Eagles schedule for the first time are: Missouri Baptist, West Georgia, Tennessee Wesleyan, Western Michigan, Toledo, Roanoke, IU Northwest and Western Illinois. ISUE continues their series with Franklin, Marian, S.I.U. Edwardsville, IUPUI, IU Southeast, Oakland City, Bellarmine and Transylvania.

Wayne Boultinghouse, Athletic Director and Basketball Coach, is delighted with the appeal of next season's schedule. "The schedule represents the growth of our basketball program," comments Coach Boultinghouse. "We have continually strengthened our schedule. Now it presents a tremendous challenge for our players and a gate attraction for our fans. Next season, our program should reflect some maturity."

COACH BOULTINGHOUSE SIGNS THIRD RECRUIT, Dan Labhart, recent graduate of Boonville High School, has signed a full grant-in-aid to attend ISUE in the fall. Dan lead his team to an 18-8 record before they were ousted by Jeffersonville in semi-state action.

Boonville coach, Jack Ford, is high in his praise of his graduating player. "Dan is the best guard that I ever coached. He was always assigned to the opponent's best offensive guard, but this didn't detract from his ability to contribute in all phases of the game. He is a super young man."

The 6' guard excelled off the court as well. He ranks in the top 5% of his graduating class. He is a two-year member of the National Honor Society, serves as a Boy's State representative, made Academic All-State, and was President of the Student Council. He carries a 3.60 grade point average and plans on majoring in math at ISUE.

ISUE head coach, Wayne Boultinghouse, signed Dan with great enthusiasm. He had been a season long recruiting target for Coach Boultinghouse and his staff. "Dan Labhart is a proven leader and winner," comments Coach Boultinghouse. "It was our intent to recruit players with good attitudes that excelled in defense as well as offense. Dan has all those attributes."

The signing of Dan Labhart was the third for ISUE this spring. Previously recruited were 6'3" Nelson Faulkner and 6'6" Randy Curl.
