## Eagles host Great Lakes Regional; Lady Eagles play at Louisville

The USI Eagles — men and women — head into postseason play and a shot at their respective Elite Eight competitions. The Eagles are top seed in the Great Lakes Regional and will host the men's teams, while the fifth-seed Lady Eagles are headed for Bellarmine College in Louisville.

The Lady Eagles meet fourth-seed Oakland at 7 p.m. (Evansville time) Thursday, hoping for revenge for the loss Oakland handed them last year as Oakland went on to win the 1995 regional. IU/PU-Fort Wayne will play Lake Superior State at 4:45 p.m. Thursday; the winner will face Northern Michigan at 4:45 p.m. Friday. Bellarmine will play the winner of the USI/Oakland match at 7 p.m. The championship will be at 6:30 p.m. Saturday.
