The comprehensive cost per semester to attend is around \$8,360 for tuition, fees, room and board. Extra costs will include your airfare, books and personal expenses.

President signs omnibus appropriations bill for FY-97

On Sept. 30, President Clinton signed into law an omnibus appropriations measure for Fiscal Year 1997 that substantially increases funding for education programs by \$3.5 billion over FY-96 levels.

The legislation was approved by large, bipartisan majorities in both houses of Congress in sharp contrast to last year's budget battle that ended up in stalemate and two government shutdowns.

Ironically, this year's education funding debate, fueled by public support of education in the polls, resulted in a bidding war between the Administration and Republican congressional leaders.

Many also credit the efforts of the


education community, students and parents for this victory. Without the continuous pressure on Congress and the Administration, it would have been much easier for both parties to pass a status quo funding measure in their pursuit of an early adjournment.


The resulting funding levels for student aid are dramatically different than those approved for FY-96. Of particular note are increases of almost \$214 million in the Federal Work Study Program and \$230 increase in the Federal Pell Grant maximum award (to \$2,700).

The new law also included funding for Federal Perkins Loan Federal Capital Contributions and State Student Incentive Grants, both of which were originally slated for no

Legislators also provided \$491 million for Direct Loan Administration, which is the level requested by the President.
