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## PROFESSORS DEVELOP COMPUTER PROGRAM FOR CHEMICAL EMERGENCIES

The possibility of a tragedy occurring in the United States of the proportions of Bhopal, India, where thousands died or became chronically ill because of an industrial chemical leak, has worried government, industry, and environmental leaders since.

Two USI professors -- **Dr. Howard E. Dunn**, professor of chemistry, and **Dr. Benjamin P. Miller**, professor of physics -- have developed a computerized atmospheric dispersion modeling program which they believe will temper the impact of such a leak.

The program -- AIRMOD -- will allow emergency planners to preview the extent and speed of the spread of spilled or released chemical fumes, making the development of efficient evacuation plans possible. The two professors have worked on the program for 12 years, recently assisted by the support of a Lilly Endowment/Extended University Program grant.

"We must become knowledgeable about the potential hazards in such releases," Dr. Dunn declared. "In this research, we have learned how important timing will be. A quick response by a well-informed public would reduce the impact of a major accident."

Dr. Dunn and Dr. Miller recently took AIRMOD to the University of Kansas at Lawrence, where an experimentally-controlled portable smokestack and monitored weather conditions were used to verify the continuous-source (smokestack) portion of the program. "The data validated our program," Dr. Dunn said. "We were excited to see the accuracy of our

system."

Evacuation plans have become a primary concern in local emergency planning, as legislators across the country reacted to the Bhopal tragedy and ordered plans developed. AIRMOD now can be included in the computer programs which have resulted. Unlike some other programs, AIRMOD was designed to be run on personal computers by operators with little or no previous training. It in reality is three programs in one -- a program to monitor continuous-source emissions, one to deal with instantaneous releases, and a third to monitor evaporative spills. Each was developed and added to the program as the two professors broadened their expertise.

A free workshop for emergency planners from six local counties -- Vanderburgh, Posey, Warrick, Gibson, and Dubois in Indiana, and Henderson, Kentucky -- will be held Saturday, April 28, at the USI Technology Center, to introduce AIRMOD. Dr. Dunn and Dr. Miller will lead the workshop. Participants will get hands-on experience in using the computer program to work with data from their home counties and will receive copies of AIRMOD for use in their local planning, all as part of the program supported by the Lilly/EUP grant.

AIRMOD is being marketed by the USI professors, whose papers on their work have attracted interest from as far away as Copenhagen, Denmark. AIRMOD includes a manual and a full set of programs which will run on IBM-compatible personal computers, and is available for \$300 by contacting Dr. Dunn at extension 1715.

**SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT PLANNING.** An Evansville area public hearing will be held at 6 p.m. Wednesday, May 2, in room 43 at Ivy Tech-Southwest, 3501 First Avenue, as part of the initial planning for Indiana's new comprehensive solid waste law, House Bill 1240, signed by Governor Evan Bayh on March 20.

The law requires Indiana counties to form solid waste districts, estimate waste generation rates, and plan for management of that waste for the next 20 years. It includes measures designed to certify and closely monitor out-of-state waste and sets statewide goals for reducing the amount of solid waste landfilled and incinerated by the year 2000. It also provides funding and taxing authority to solid waste districts.

The Indiana Department of Environmental Management (IDEM) and the consultant firm of R. W. Beck and Associates of Carmel, Indiana, are preparing the statewide plan, which will inventory the status of current solid waste management, identify alternative strategies and district planning and funding requirements, and develop public information materials and a model district plan.

Because the plan will affect how each Indiana resident handles solid waste and pays for its disposal, citizen views and ideas are considered crucial to the research. The Eiteljorg, which opened in June 1989 at 500 W. Washington Street, is one of only two museums east of the Mississippi that combines collections of Western art and Native American art and artifacts. It will be the only mid-U.S. museum to present this exhibit.
