



SILVER ANNIVERSARY TO BE UNIVERSITY-WIDE OBSERVANCE

USI's Silver Anniversary observance September 10-15 will be a University-wide celebration, as students, faculty and staff, and alumni participate in events celebrating the first 25 years.

The major event will be the Silver Anniversary Gala dinner at 8 p.m. Saturday, September 15, in the Indiana Room at Robert E. Green Convention Center. The keynote speaker will be Mr. Charles McDowell, newspaper columnist and public television panelist on programs dealing with politics and presidential campaigns. His presentation is described as reminiscent of Will Rogers.

Tickets for the dinner are \$50 per person, which includes \$25 earmarked for the University's Presidential Scholarship program for Indiana valedictorians and salutatorians; corporations also may reserve a table for eight for \$1,000. Scholarship recipients will be among Gala celebrities.

Other 25th Anniversary observances will include a "Professional-in-Residence" series in which USI alumni will return to campus to discuss their careers and successes with current students, and several special events planned by student organizations.

The "Professional-in-Residence" series will include:

Friday, September 7 -- Dr. Joey V. Barnett, Class of '81 (biology) and a faculty member at Harvard Medical School's Brigham and Women's Hospital, will meet with School of Science and Engineering Technology students at 1 p.m. in Forum III. He currently is working in the Division of Genetics at Harvard's Howard Hughes Medical Institute, learning molecular biology techniques to answer questions on cell

communication and response. He investigates how heart cells in a developing chick embryo respond to environmental cues which cause the cells to migrate to their proper location.

Monday, September 10 -- Ms. Catherine Wheeler Jensen, Class of '78 (dental hygiene), will meet with School of Nursing and Health Professions students at 8 a.m. in UC350-352. She is an associate professor and coordinator of dental hygiene programs at Southern Illinois University's School of Technical Careers, Carbondale, where she was chosen 1988 Outstanding Teacher of the Year. She currently is working on her doctorate at SIU.

Mr. Theriac's presentation will be followed by a panel presentation at 11 a.m. in UC350-352, featuring three social work alumni: Ms. Brenda Jones, Class of '88 and director of the Owensboro (Kentucky) Spouse Abuse Center; Ms. Barbara Wedding, Class of '89 and coordinator of Patient and Family Services, Evansville Cancer Center; and Ms. Luzada Hayes, Class of '90.

Participants in the opening programs on Monday and Wednesday are invited to arrive a half hour early and join the "Professional-in-Residence" group for coffee and pastries. Wednesday's panel discussion will be followed by lunch, with participants invited to go through the cafeteria line and join the "Professional-in-Residence" group in UC309A.

PRESIDENTIAL SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS BEING HONORED

The 55 Presidential Scholarship recipients -- including 17 valedictorians and six salutatorians who enrolled as freshmen this fall -- will be honorED guests for several 25th Anniversary events at the University of Southern Indiana.

The first was a picnic given by President and Mrs. David L. Rice at the University Home on Sunday, August 26. The next major event will be the University's Silver Anniversary Gala on September 15.

The Presidential Scholarships guarantee up to \$4,600 a year for four years to cover tuition, books, fees, and room and board for students who graduate from accredited Indiana high schools as either valedictorians or salutatorians and continue to meet eligibility criteria at the University.

The scholarships were inaugurated by the USI Foundation in 1988 to attract the top students to USI. They are funded through private gifts, with more than \$500,000 raised to date. There have been two endowed scholarships (\$75,000 each) -- JARCO - A. Wayne Place Endowed Presidential Scholarship and Robert L. Koch Memorial Endowed Presidential Scholarship -- with a third in process. Full-scholarship funding (\$4,600 a year for four years) has been committed by ten Evansville businesses and individuals. Other contributions come from the community and University employees.

The 1990 campaign goal is \$390,000. The endowed and full four-year scholarships will be named in tribute to the donors. Anyone interested in endowing a Presidential Scholarship or supporting the program, either by attending the Gala and/or through a gift, may contact the USI Foundation of-
