PANEL TO DISCUSS STUDENT UNREST

A panel discussion about student unrest will be conducted at the 119th Indiana State Teachers Conference on November 2. Panel members include Albert A. Woll, former school board member and member of the ISUE Foundation Board of Directors; Glen Kinzie, associate professor of education at ISUE; and Steve Hollander, a local high school student. Topics to be considered include the community's view of student unrest, the University and student activism, and a student's opinion of student unrest. The discussion, which is scheduled in the Harrison High School Library, will be held for two sessions, at 9:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m.

GERMAN PUBLICATIONS ACCEPTED

Thomas Eichman, Assistant Professor of German, has had accepted for publication two articles he submitted this summer to European journals.

The first article, "The Development of Gmc. *kann-" was accepted for early 1973 publication in Amsterdamer Beitrage zur aelteren Germanistik, a journal published in Holland and devoted to literary and linguistic research of the older Germanic period. The article deals with the phonological and morphological development of a certain verb in pre-historic Germanic times.

A second article, "Althochdeutsch sinnan 'streben nach', sanskritisch san-, sa- 'gewinnen', und hethitisch sanh- 'erstreben'", will be published in the 87th volume, 1973, of Zeitschrift fuer vergleichende Sprachforschung, a long existing journal, published in Goettingen, West Germany, and devoted to research in comparative Indo-European studies. The article deals with the Germanic and Indo-European connections of a certain Old High German verb and makes a contribution to Germanic etymology.

OPEN HEARING ON ISUE'S EDUCATIONAL PURPOSE AND INSTRUCTIONAL PROGRAMS

ISUE Self-Study Committee One will hold its first public meeting at 3:30 p.m. on Wednesday, November 8, 1972, in Room 118 on the lower level of the Library. This committee is evaluating the University's educational purpose and its instructional programs. Members of the committee are Dr. Ted DeVries, chairman, Dean Donald Bennett, Dr. Glenn Kinzie, Dr. Michael Pasko, Dr. Donald Pitzer, Dr. Victoria Pohl, and Dr. Frank Stanonis.

The committee is one of five self-study committee engaged in evaluating every aspect of ISUE. Other committees will evaluate ISUE's organization and administration, physical and financial resources, faculty, students, and library. Results of the studies will be published in the spring as a part of the process leading to eventual independent accreditation by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

Interested members of the faculty, administrative staff, or student body are invited to attend this public meeting to observe or to offer comments and suggestions for committee consideration. Other committees will announce similar meetings in the near future.

TAX DEFERRED ANNUITIES FOR FULL-TIME STAFF

The Indiana State University Board of Trustees has approved the participation of ALL FULL-TIME STAFF in tax deferred annuity programs with outside

insurance companies. This program is in addition to the existing tax deferred annuity program with the University TIAA-CREF Retirement Program. The University has agreed to make payroll deductions for these programs with outside companies; however, the University will not make any contributions toward such programs.

Each outside company must have a minimum of ten applications on file with the University Payroll Office before payroll deductions will be made for a particular company. The following companies have complied with the stipulation of the University requiring the completion of a detailed questionnaire which sets forth in summary form financial as well as other pertinent data regarding the annuity programs of each company. This information is on file in the Office of Insurance, Fringe Benefits, and Payroll, Room B-11, Administration Building, Terre Haute, Indiana.

Life Science	367	<u>Plant Anatomy and Taxonomy</u> Principles of taxonomy, evolution, and anatomy. Emphasis on variation within and relationships between selected orders and families of vascular and nonvascular plants represented in the Indiana flora. Lectures - 2 hours; laboratory - 1 credit hour. (2 hours contact)	3 Hours
History	448	<u>Europe 1650-1815</u> A study of Absolutism and Revolution in their political, economic, religious, social, and artistic aspects, from Louis XIV to the French Revolution and the Napoleonic aftermath. Prerequisite: History 152.	3 Hours

NEW COURSES

Psychology	375	<u>Psychometrics</u> Introduction to the general area of mental measurement. Theory and content of measuring devices in the fields of intelligence, interests, personality and special aptitudes. This course does not meet requirements for teacher certification. Prerequisites: 6 hours of psychology including Psychology 302.	3 Hours
History	499	<u>Seminar in European History</u> A research course in selected fields of European History. Prerequisites: History 151, 152 and 310, or consent of Instructor.	3 Hours
English	320	<u>Literature and Social Criticism</u> By way of study and class discussion of various literary works, a consideration of the techniques, the problems, and the value of interpreting literature in terms of social theory and as the reflection of the author's unspoken assumptions and explicit beliefs about the nature of society. Offered for both general education and/or major and minor in English. Prerequisite: post-freshman standing.	3 Hours
Science	350	<u>Polymer Chemistry</u> This is a one-semester general science course consisting of three one-hour lecture sessions each week. Prerequisite: one semester of Organic Chemistry, one semester of physics or their equivalents.	3 Hours
Education	198	<u>Correction of Reading Skills</u> This course is open to freshmen students who exhibit deficiencies in reading skill. It is designed to correct reading skill deficiencies which might prevent the student from being successful in his initial experiences in college.	3 Hours
