SIHE BREAKS GROUND. On Monday afternoon, October 17, ground was broken by Southern Indiana Higher Education, Inc. for ISUE's first student housing complex. Mid-America Student Housing, a \$3.6 million housing project, will have 10 two-story buildings and an administration building adjacent to campus on Clarke Lane. Projected for completion in Fall, 1984, the complex will have 36 one-bedroom and 136 two-bedroom apartments. ISUE OPENS JOGGING COURSE. ISUE officially opened a Wells Fargo Gamefield Jogging Course during its Open House activities on Sunday, October 16. The course which begins and ends just south of the Physical Activities Center was funded by a \$2,500 grant from the Wells Fargo Bank of California.

The course has 20 exercise stations along the two-mile jogging route. Walkers and joggers may use pavement or earth surface as they move across campus, around Reflection Lake, through Bent Twig Woods, and past the tennis courts and intramural fields. The course is open to the public during daytime hours. Further details on the use of the course will be published in the next issue of University Notes.

TWO EDUCATION PROGRAMS APPROVED. The Commission on Teacher Training and Licensing of the Indiana State Board of Education has unanimously approved the addition of two education programs at ISUE. They are a Data Processing Endorsement and a Junior High/Middle School Reading (primary) program.

HARRY S. TRUMAN SCHOLARSHIP. The Harry S. Truman Scholarship Foundation announces that nominations are open for the 1984-85 scholarship. Each scholarship covers tuition, fees, books, and a room and board allowance up to a maximum of \$5,000 annually. The 105 awards will be made on the basis of merit (GPA of at least 3.00 and in upper fourth of class) to students who will be college juniors in the 1984-85 year (have between 46 and 78 semester hours by next fall). Students who have demonstrated outstanding potential for leadership at the federal, state or local level are sought. Each college or university may nominate two U.S. citizens who are students to compete in the 1984 scholarship competition. All nomination materials (application forms, essays, and letters of recommendation) must be postmarked by December 1, 1983.
