UNITED WAY CONTRIBUTIONS UP 8 PERCENT

The USI United Way campaign has raised \$17,485, up 8 percent over 1989 and the most impressive campaign to date, according to reports submitted at the campaign appreciation reception on Friday, November 29. Contributions and pledges still are coming in that are expected to take the final total closer to the \$18,000 goal.

"Fair Share" incentive awards were won by Mr. Robert F. Grimm, engineering drafter, clerical/support staff; Ms. Helen A. Loudermilk, assistant to the Registrar, administrative staff; and Ms. Sheila D. Melander, assistant professor of nursing, faculty.

Traveling plaques for the highest per capita and highest percent of "Fair Share" giving went to the cluster of Alumni Affairs et al.
