Two guest speakers will be on campus Monday, August 20, for orientation programs for faculty and administrative staff and for new fall students.

**Dr. J. Herman Blake**, vice-chancellor for undergraduate education at Indiana/Purdue-Indianapolis, will be the speaker for the Fall Faculty/Administrative Staff Meeting in Forum I. Coffee and donuts will be available at 8:30 a.m., with the program to begin at 9 a.m. Annual photographs will be taken in FA54, beginning at 8 a.m.

Student activities will get under way Sunday, August 19, with family orientation. Brunch will be available in the USI Dining Room from 11 a.m. to 12:45 p.m. The program will start at 1 p.m. in the Physical Activities Center and will include a new information session for parents on Greek life on campus.

Monday's orientation will begin 8 a.m. in the PAC Arena. **Dr. Will Keim**, internationally known lecturer and humorist, will speak at 10:30 a.m. on "Welcome to the Time of Your Life." Lunch on the UC Mall also will offer an Activities Fair, where new students may learn how they can become involved in USI campus life. Advisement and registration is slated Wednesday, August 22, for new students who did not pre-register or finalize pre-registration. Open registration will be held Thursday, August 23. Each will be done alphabetically, starting with A through D at 8:30 a.m.

Student orientation week activities will close with an all-campus dance at 9 p.m. Friday, August 23, featuring a live band. It is sponsored by the Activities Programming Board and AMIGOs.

## PAINTING CHURCHES TO CLOSE NEW HARMONY SEASON

New Harmony Theatre's "very successful" Season 1990 will close with Ms. Tina Howe's *Painting Churches*, to be presented Friday, August 10, through Sunday, August 26, at Murphy Auditorium.

Mr. Steve Williford, Season 1990 artistic director, is directing the three-member cast of Evansville actors -- Ms. Pat Carroll and Mr. Paul Caywood as the Churches, who must move from their Boston townhouse to Cape Cod, and Ms. Sherri Barron, the daughter who comes to help them move.

Mr. Williford said the major theme is the father's debilitating illness, Alzheimer's disease. The play deals also with mother/daughter estrangement, he said, and abandonment -- the parents "abandoned" their daughter as she was growing up, to lead their own lives, and now must abandon

affluent life in Boston for austere Cape Cod surroundings. But the play is a comedy, Mr. Williford said -- a dark comedy, with serious, poignant moments.

Ms. Carroll had the title role in *Driving Miss Daisy*, with which New Harmony Theatre opened Season 1990, while both Mr. Caywood and Ms.

Barron were in the second production, *The Curious Savage*, and in the 1989 NHT hit, *Foxfire*.

Mr. Williford and Dr. James R. Blevins, dean of the USI School of Liberal Arts, negotiated a contract with Actors Equity Association to employ professional actors for Season 1990. "Our aim was to invest more energy and money in increasing the quality of the productions," Mr. Williford said, noting feedback on the first two productions indicates audiences believe they achieved their goal.

The USI Arts and Humanities Society is sponsoring an opening night theatre party for *Painting Churches*, to celebrate the successful season. The group will meet at USI at 5:30 p.m. and travel by bus to New Harmony for dinner at 6 p.m. at the Red Geranium and the 8 p.m. performance.

Curtain time for the final production will be 8 p.m. Fridays and Saturdays and 2 p.m. Sundays. Tickets are \$10 for general admission, \$8 for students and senior citizens, and are available at the Murphy Auditorium box office, 812/682-3115, or make reservations in the School of Liberal Arts, extension 1635.
