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USI COMMENCEMENT

USI's 22nd Commencement will be held at 7 p.m. Saturday, May 9, in Roberts Stadium, when 860 seniors will be eligible to receive degrees -- some 30 master, 695 bachelor, and 135 associate degrees. Ms. Laura L. Huber of Cannelton, Indiana, will graduate summa cum laude; the 1992 honors graduates also include 32 magna cum laude

Dr. George B. Weathersby, former Indiana Commissioner for Higher Education and a member of the first USI Board, will bring the Commencement address. Honorary degrees will be conferred upon Dr. Weathersby; Mrs. Bettye B. McCutchan, life member and secretary of the USI Foundation Board of Directors; and Mr. Wil-

liam A. Koch, developer of Holiday World. The 1992 Distinguished Professor Award and the President's Medal, highest honor for a graduating senior, will be presented (see separate items).

In other events planned for Commencement weekend, the USI Alumni Association will hold its Senior Reception/Dinner Friday, May 8, in the UC Dining Room. The reception will start at 6 p.m., with dinner at 7. The association will honor 1992 graduates and present the Distinguished Alumni, Alumni Service, Special Recognition, and Faculty Recognition awards (see separate item).

The USI Board of Trustees, gathered for Commencement, will hold its May meeting at 10 a.m. Saturday, May 9, at the University Center.

The Ivy Tech Commencement will be held at 10 a.m. at the Physical Activities Center. The Dental Assisting graduation will be held at 11 a.m. Saturday in Forum I. The Nurses' Completion Ceremony will be held at 2:30 p.m. in the Physical Activities Center; a reception will follow.

There will be a reception for 1992 graduates and their families from 4 to 5 p.m. at the University Home.

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DISTINGUISHED PROFESSOR AWARD

Dr. Aldo F. Cardarelli, professor of education and chair of the Teacher Education Department, will be presented the 1992 Distinguished Professor Award at the USI Commencement. He will receive a monetary award and a scholarship will be presented in his name. The award is made possible by a generous gift from National City Bank of Evansville.

Dr. Cardarelli received his bachelor's degree from LeMoyne College, and a master's and Ph.D. from Syracuse University. He taught in the public schools of Syracuse, New York, and on the faculty of Syracuse University, Utica College, and University of Nevada-Las Vegas before coming to USI in 1974.

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PRESIDENT'S MEDAL

Mrs. Debbie L. Seib will be presented the President's Medal, the highest recognition given to a graduating senior, on May 9 when she will graduate magna cum laude with majors in accounting and computer information systems. The Faculty Senate Student Academic Affairs Committee chose her for the honor because of her commitment to academic excellence and her service to the University and community.

A consistent Dean's List student, Mrs. Seib worked as a student assistant in the School of Business, has been president of the USI Inter-Business Council and Administrative Management Soci-

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prove access to public programs for all Hoosiers. As a result of his review, it was recommended that the University of Southern Indiana be established as a separate state university. That recommendation became reality two years after he left the Commission, and he was appointed to serve on the first USI Board of Trustees in 1985. Dr. Weathersby was a member and officer of the Board until 1991, when he moved from Indiana. He will receive an honorary Doctor of Laws degree in recognition of his achievements in shaping higher education opportunities in Indiana.

A former faculty member at the University of California and Harvard University, Dr. Weathersby also was a White House Fellow and in this capacity, held positions as special assistant to the Secretary of State and director of research and associate staff director for the National Commission on

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A specialist in teaching reading, Dr. Cardarelli won a \$265,431 Lilly Endowment grant in 1990 for an innovative proposal to expand the reading interest of middle school teachers and ultimately to improve the quality and quantity of reading among middle school students. This year, 58 Indiana schools are participating in the "Teachers Under Cover" project. Dr. Cardarelli has been administrator of this two-year grant in addition to successfully managing new duties this year as chair of the Department of Teacher Education. He is widely published and *The Reading Teacher*, a journal of the International Reading Association, plans to publish his article on "Teachers Under Cover" this spring.

Dr. Cardarelli has been advisor of Kappa Delta Pi, national honor society in education, for 15 years. In 1990, Kappa Delta Pi presented him the Honor Key for "outstanding contributions to the field of education." Dr. Cardarelli has been chairman of the USI United Fund campaign, a member of the Faculty Senate, and several ad hoc committees; he also chaired the state textbook selection committee of southwestern Indiana. He has been a Boy Scout cubmaster, a volunteer for Channel 9 and the Salvation Army, and involved in childrens' projects such as Head Start, Project SELF, and the public library's Story Hour.

Mrs. McCutchan has been a life member of the USI Foundation Board of Directors since 1974 and has been secretary of the Board since 1980. She has been active with the nominating and executive committees and each of the University's fund-raising efforts. An Evansville native, Mrs. McCutchan has been a leader in civic and cultural activities, including the Evansville Museum of Arts and Science, the Evansville Philharmonic Orchestra, and the Evansville Arts and Education Council; she also has served on the boards of the Evansville Blind Association and Evansville Day School. Mrs. McCutchan is the widow of Mr. John E. McCutchan, Evansville insurance execu-

tive and a trustee of Indiana State University in the developing years of the Evansville campus. She will receive a Doctor of Laws degree in recognition of extraordinary service to the University.

Mr. Koch, who has been executive vice president and director of George Koch Sons in Evansville, will receive a Doctor of Laws degree in recognition of his efforts to enhance economic development in southern Indiana. In 1956, he conceived a relocation plan for Interstate 64 that was adopted and moved the Indiana section from a Louisville-Loogootee-Vincennes alignment to its present location. He was instrumental in the '60s in establishing the Lincoln Boyhood National Memorial, the incorporating of the town of Santa Claus, and establishing the community's first bank. Since 1946, he has been active in the development of what is now Holiday World Theme Park and currently is chief executive officer of Santa Claus Land, Inc., Christmas Lake Golf Course

In 1991, she was chosen as one of 36 American teacher honorees in "The Walt Disney Company Presents the American Teacher Awards" and she was awarded a Lilly Endowment Teacher Creativity Fellowship to compare British and American perspectives on the colonization of America and the Revolutionary War.
