**GERMAN PROFESSORS OF ECONOMICS TO LECTURE.** **Dr. Peter Gey** and **Dr. Wolfgang Quaisser**, assistant professors of economics at Goethe University in West Frankfurt, Germany, will be guest lecturers at USI on Thursday, November 7. They will discuss "The Political and Economic Reforms in China" and "The Cuban Economy Today" in programs at 2 and 7 p.m. in Forum II. The two are former colleagues of **Dr. Walter Jermakowicz**, a Warsaw native who is a new associate professor of business at USI. Their visit here is being co-sponsored by the Office of Academic Affairs and Campus Ministry.

**PSYCHOLOGY PAPERS CLEARING HOUSE PLANNED.** The establishment of a Clearinghouse for Teaching/Learning Activities in Psychology was announced at the recent Mid-America Conference for Teachers of Psychology, with **Dr. Joseph J. Palladino**, USI assistant professor of psychology, to serve as the initial coordinator. He will be assisted by an advisory board in the task of locating, cataloging, and disseminating the papers presented at various psychology conferences, so that educators at all levels will have access to the valuable articles, many of which were not printed in the past and were lost to potential users. The Clearinghouse will be computerized, with advisory board members now exploring ways to communicate with each other and disseminate materials via computer hook-ups. Computer facilities will not be necessary to obtain the collected activities, however. It is anticipated the Clearinghouse will not be fully operational until 1986. Contributions are being sought, and should be submitted to Dr. Palladino at the University of Southern Indiana, 8600 University Boulevard, Evansville, IN 47712.

**NAMES IN THE NEWS.** Mrs. Marilyn Walters, director of placement, spoke at the October meeting of the American Society of Women Accountants. She discussed good interviewing skills from the interviewer's point of view. She also was selected recently by the Midwest Cooperative Education Association to serve as the general conference chairperson for the 1986 Fall Conference in Indianapolis. MCEA is a 500-member organization of co-op employers and university coordinators drawn from an eight-state region.

Sympathy also is extended to the family of Dr. Walter Joseph Wahnsiedler, who died October 18 in Evansville. He taught history at USI during its first two years of operation in Evansville. He created as many as 22 scholarships at various schools, including USI.

**BANKER TO BE EXECUTIVE-IN-RESIDENCE.** H. Lee Cooper, president, chief executive officer, and chairman of the board of Citizens National Bank, will be the Executive-in-Residence for the Division of Business' fall program, slated Tuesday, November 5. The program will start at 9 a.m. with coffee and donuts in UC 350; discussion sessions will be held at 9:30 a.m. and 1 p.m. in UC 352. The noon luncheon will be in UC 350; the cost is \$4, and reservations must be made with the Division of Business by Friday, November 1. All programs are open to the public.

Mr. Cooper joined Citizens Bank 17 years ago. He has been active in civic and community groups, and currently is chairman of the Evansville Chamber of Commerce and the Deaconess Hospital Foundation.



**USI THEATRE TO PRESENT "TO GILLIAN."** The contemporary comedy-drama, "To Gillian, On Her 37th Birthday" by **Mr. Michael Brady**, will be presented by the USI Theatre group Thursday through Saturday, November 14-15-16 and 21-22-23 at the Theatre, Igleheart and Barker avenues. Curtain time is at 8 p.m.; ticket prices are \$4 general admission, \$3 for USI students, faculty, and staff, and for senior citizens.

Mr. Brady won the 1984 Oppenheimer Award for the best new American playwright to have a work produced in New York for "To Gillian." It will be directed by **Mr. Terry Schwab** of the New Harmony Theatre Company in a cooperative effort with the USI Theatre group. **Dr. Douglas K. Hubbell**, USI director of theatre and professor of communications, will serve as artistic director. He said "To Gillian" is comedy in the sense that it has a happy ending, but the real theme is a husband recovering from grief after his wife dies in a boating accident.

An English Choral Evensong Service will be sung by the Harmonist Chorale at 8 p.m. Sunday, November 3, in St. Stephen's Episcopal Church, celebrating All Saints Sunday. **Ms. Eugenia Toole Glover** will conduct and play the organ; **Mr. Curtis Shirley** will be the trumpeter. **USI ATHLETES MAKE GOOD SHOWINGS.** USI's cross country runners captured their fifth consecutive GLVC title Saturday, October 26, in the Romeoville, Illinois, tournament, where they finished 65 points ahead of second-place Ashland. The Eagle runners were ranked 20th in the nation and fourth in the region last week, and are expected to move even higher. The women runners, ranked 18th in the nation, finished second in the conference behind top-ranked Ashland, and will go into regional competition Saturday, November 9, at Ashland. **Kim Doup** became USI's first women's cross country runner to be named to the GLVC all-conference team.

In soccer, the Eagles are a strong favorite to win their sixth consecutive GLVC title when they go to the semi-final and final competition Friday and Saturday, November 1-2, at Kentucky Wesleyan.

The Eagles volleyball team won their first tournament championship last weekend at Western Kentucky, defeating Austin Peay, Midway, Brescia, Christian Brothers, and, in the finals, Southeast Missouri.
