"SNICKEROMICS" ON THE ROAD

The Indiana Department of Financial Institutions will tape a presentation of "Snickeromics" by Dr. Gregory P. Valentine, director of the USI Center for Economic Education, as he presents the program to a sixth-grade social studies class at Castle Elementary School in Newburgh. The taping will occur on Tuesday, April 23, and DFI will use the program later in two half-hour segments that will be broadcast on public television in the Indianapolis area.

Dr. Valentine developed "Snickeromics" for off-campus presentations showing students how economics affect their daily lives. It is a blend of micro and macroeconomic theory, using a Snickers bar to show the use of limited economic resources to satisfy our unlimited economic wants. Students are introduced to the theory of supply and demand and how the price of goods and services are

The Spirit of Vincennes Rendezvous will be studied as an example of a successful community festival at Historic Southern Indiana Project's second 1991 workshop on marketing and promotions, to be held Wednesday, April 24, in Vincennes.

The group will meet at 9 a.m. (EST/CDT) at the Daughters of the American Revolution chapter house at William Henry Harrison Mansion (Grouseland). Mr. James Holcomb, superintendent of the George Rogers Clark National Historical Park, will coordinate the workshop, assisted by Mr. Marshall Miller and other Rendezvous volunteers.

HEALTH NOTES from the Human Resources Department

UTERINE CANCER - Incidence: Estimated 46,000 new invasive cases in 1991 - 13,000 cancer of cervix and 33,000 cancer of uterus, usually endometrium (lining). Invasive cervical cancer steadily decreasing; most common today among women of low socioeconomic groups, but all women are at risk. Endometrial cancer most common in mature women; diagnosis usually made after age 50.

Mortality: Estimated 4,500 deaths in 1991 from cervical cancer; 5,500 from endometrial cancer or unspecified uterine cancer; overall rate for uterine cancer decreased more than 70 percent past 40 years, due mainly to Pap test for early detection and regular checkups.

Warning Signals: Bleeding outside normal menstrual period or after menopause, or unusual vaginal discharge.

Risk Factors: Cervical cancer - early age at first intercourse, multiple sex partners, cigarette smoking, and certain sexually transmitted diseases; endometrial cancer - history of infertility, failure to ovulate, prolonged estrogen therapy, obesity.

Early Detection: Pap test is valuable simple procedure, performed at appropriate intervals as part of pelvic examination; should be done annually in women who are or have been sexually active or who have reached age 18. After three consecutive examinations with normal findings, test may be less frequent, at the discretion of physician; effective in detecting early cancer of the cervix, only partially effective in detecting endometrial cancer and women at high risk should have tissue sample evaluated at menopause. During menopause, hormones (estrogens) normally produced by ovaries declines, causing symptoms such as "hot flashes" or thinning of vaginal lining (can make sexual intercourse painful). Estrogen replacement therapy can increase risk of endometrial cancer; benefits and risks of treatment should be discussed with physician.

Treatment: Uterine cancers generally are treated by surgery or radiation, or by combination of the two. In precancerous (in situ) stages, changes in the cervix may be treated by cryotherapy (destroying cells by extreme cold), by electrocoagulation (destroying tissue by intense electric current heat), or by local surgery. Precancerous endometrial changes may be treated with progesterone.

Survival: Five-year survival rate for all cervical cancer patients is 67 percent, 88 percent for patients diagnosed early, virtually 100 percent if the disease is in situ. Endometrial cancer survival rate is 85 percent overall, 93 percent if discovered at early stage, virtually 100 percent if discovered at precancerous lesion stage.
