


Ulrich Littmann to lecture as GERMANY IN US distinguished speaker



Dr. Ulrich Littmann will present "Partners Distant and Close - The U.S. and Germany" at 7 p.m., Wednesday, November 10, in Mitchell Auditorium, Health Professions Center. Dr. Littmann will offer an informed perspective on the history of the U.S. - German friendship in the postwar world and address the many challenges of that evolving relationship.

Dr. Littmann of Bonn, Germany, served for 31 years until 1994 as the executive director for the German Fulbright Kommission, administering and designing exchanges between Germany and the U.S. His German Fulbright Program has continued to be the largest of the global exchanges, recognized in Washington, D.C. at the time of his retirement as the flagship of all Fulbright programs.

A large number of Germany's leading prime ministers and cabinet officers have passed through his Fulbright program, and the friendships established in those years have continued to this day, affording Dr. Littmann an insider's view of unfolding events involving Germany and the U.S. in the post-war era.

The Fulbright program was established under the Fulbright-Hayes Act to promote international understanding around the globe through exchanges of talented students, teachers, and researchers.

"Dr. Littmann's latest book, *Partners Distant and Close: U.S. German Academic Mobility: 1923-93*, is one of the most knowledgeable and informative studies of the U.S. - German relationship during that period," said **Dr. Susan Wolfe**, associate professor of German.

Helen Mallette Studio Theatre's first production scheduled for November

The drama *All My Sons* will be the first production in the Helen Mallette Studio Theatre in the University's new Liberal Arts Center. Scheduled for 10 performances in November, the play tells the story of a man searching for the truth behind allegations that his father sold defective parts to the Army during World War II.

Opening night on Thursday, November 11, will be a tribute performance in honor of Ms. Helen Mallette, whose generous donation furnished the facility that bears her name. Other opening night special events, including dinner and a post-performance reception, are being planned by the USI Society for Arts and Humanities. Tickets for the Gala Evening are available at \$50 per person or \$75 per patron (includes a donation to the USI Society for Arts & Humanities) through the Office of Special Events, extension 1930. Curtain time is 8 p.m. The dinner begins at 6:30 p.m.

Dr. James R. Blevins, dean of the School of Liberal Arts, will direct the production. He directed the same play for USI Theatre in 1987, which was both an artistic success and a popular success. Blevins said he thought it appropriate to open the new theatre facilities with a new production of *All My Sons*.

All My Sons will continue at 8 p.m. Friday and Saturday, November 12 - 13, and November 19 - 20; 2 p.m. Sunday, November 14 and 21, 7 p.m. Tuesday and Wednesday, November 16 - 17, and at 10 a.m. Thursday, November 14. GERMANY IN US lecture will review the life and works of German prisoner of war artist

Dr. Donald S. Wolfe, associate professor of German, will remember a World War II prisoner of war with the slide lecture "Daniel Mayer: German P.O.W. artist of Camp Breckenridge, Kentucky" at 7 p.m. on Monday, November 8, at the Evansville Museum of Arts and Sciences. A reception will be held in the main gallery immediately following the presentation.

Daniel Meyer arrived at Camp Breckenridge in May 1943 as one of nearly 400,000 German prisoners-of-war scattered in camps throughout the U.S. during World War II. Although he had been wounded twice and was in ill health when he arrived there, this self-taught artist left behind a prodigious number of wall murals in the prisoner barracks and dining halls.

Today, approximately 30 landscapes remain on the walls of the former American non-commissioned officers' mess hall as a testament to the joy and beauty that he brought to friends and foe alike.

Mr. Mayer himself, however, was never again to see the homeland that he so lovingly portrayed with his brush. He was barely able to complete his major work, a 10-foot by 30-foot mural of Castle Werneck in Central Germany. Sickness and his nagging wounds made it impossible to continue to climb the ladder to paint and he died in October 1945, just as those whose lives had been sustained by his art were beginning to return to Germany.

Dr. Wolfe will show slides of Mayer's work and share Mayer's family correspondence.

"The remarkable thing about this man is that he painted in terrible ill health, dying right after completing his ultimate work. Mayer created beauty for the rest of the prisoners - images of their homeland - and sacrificed himself to do it," said Dr. Wolfe.

Mr. Mayer's daughter is still living. She and Dr. Wolfe began corresponding after he sent her enlargements of photos taken of the painted murals; she had never seen her father's work. For her part, she sent Dr. Wolfe copies of all the letters her father had written home to the family during the war and provided him with the details of her father's life as she knew them.

115th IAS meeting to be held at USI

The Indiana Academy of Science will hold its 115th Annual Meeting at USI on Thursday and Friday, November 4 and 5 in the Science Center and in the University Center. Faculty, graduate, and undergraduate students from Indiana colleges and universities will attend.

This is the first time the meeting will be held at USI. The meeting was last held in Evansville in 1991.

The academy is a non-profit organization whose purpose is to promote scientific research and to encourage communication between Indiana scientists and others conducting research pertaining to Indiana. Membership in the academy is open to science faculty in Indiana's private and state colleges and universities. **Dr. James Bandoli**, associate professor of biology, and **Dr. Nils I. Johansen**, lecturer in science and engineering technology, are co-chairs of the meeting.

Seminar for academic advising


