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USI BOARD APPROVES NEW PROGRAMS

The USI Board of Trustees has approved two new programs, a Bachelor of Science in Nursing to be offered in Vincennes and Jasper in cooperation with Vincennes University, and a Master of Social Work offered through the School of Education and Human Services. Both are being submitted to the Commission for Higher Education for approval and to the Indiana General Assembly for funding.

The cooperative agreement with Vincennes University answers the need for baccalaureate-prepared nurses for residents of Vincennes and Jasper. Officials of Good Samaritan Hospital, Vincennes, and St. Joseph's Hospital, Huntingburg, and Vincennes University participated in program discussions.

The Master of Social Work, providing graduate-level instruction and training for southern Indiana residents, is the second program in the state; the other is offered in Indianapolis. Dr. Robert L. Reid, vice president for Academic Affairs, said, "Health

and human service agencies in southern Indiana report a continual, unmet need for qualified candidates to fill social work positions. This degree program responds to the need for trained professionals."

In other business at its May meeting, the USI Board:

-- Approved a \$21,193,828 operating budget for the 1991 fiscal year, an increase of 9.5 percent over this year's budget. Salaries, wages, and employee benefits make up 73 percent of the budget, with instruction and instruction-related expenditures accounting for 59 percent of the total.

-- Selected the architectural firm of Odle, McGuire & Shook of Bloomington and Indianapolis to prepare plans and cost estimates for the proposed Health Professions Building, and approved contracts to remodel Science Center classrooms into science laboratories.

-- Approved a \$2.75 fee increase for Indiana-resident undergraduate students, bring-

ing the 1990-91 per-credit-hour cost to \$56.25. Other fee increases, with credit-hour totals in parenthesis, will be \$4 for Indiana-resident graduate students (\$82); \$6.50 for non-resident undergraduate students (\$136.50); and \$8 for non-resident graduate students (\$164).

Athletic-ticket price approvals included \$60 for a family season ticket, a \$40 increase; \$35 for individual tickets; and \$4 for a single-game ticket, a \$2 increase. The non-USI student and child price remains \$1, with USI students to continue being admitted free with a valid student ID card.

DR. RAY MARSHALL TO LECTURE

Dr. Ray Marshall, U.S. Secretary of Labor from 1977 to 1981, will deliver a public lecture on Wednesday, June 13, in a program co-sponsored by the Indiana Gender Equity Cadre and the Southern Indiana Labor-Management Education Forum.

Dr. Marshall will discuss "The Workforce Needs of Tomorrow" at 7 p.m. in Forum I, focusing on the increasing demands facing workers and organizations in the coming decade. With rapid changes in technology, requiring a better-educated and more flexible workforce, coupled with more intense domestic and interna-

tional competition, all firms will be challenged constantly to produce top quality goods and services at competitive prices. The workforce of the '90s and beyond will have a different composition and culture; societal and economic changes will cause a different workplace to evolve. Dr. Marshall is highly sought after as a presenter, drawing laudatory comments from his audiences on the clear and important message he delivers.
