COMMUNITY HEALTH CARE FORUM. Robert F. Murray, M.D., will present a lecture entitled "What are the Crucial Issues in Health Care Facing the Nation in the 80's?" on Thursday, April 23, at Welborn Baptist Hospital. This is the last program of a four-part community health care forum sponsored by ISUE and the Welborn Baptist Hospital Foundation.

Dr. Murray will discuss the development of health care policy changes, the effect of shifting federal emphasis in health care funding, new health care delivery patterns such as health maintenance organizations, the effects of environmental factors on health care, biomedical research, and the effect of changing retirement laws and the increasingly older population on health care.

As a distinguished medical educator and human geneticist, he has demonstrated a serious concern for the ethical, social, and legal aspects of advances in medical genetics. His research has included studies of

HEALTH CARE FORUM (continued). factors influencing genetic counseling, genetic and developmental variations in isoenzymes, bio-ethics, and inherited susceptibility to disease.

The lecture will begin at 7:00 p.m. in the Welborn Baptist Hospital Auditorium. The public is invited to attend.

SUB PRESENTS FREE PERFORMANCE BY MUSICAL COMIC. A rising young musical comic, Mark McCollum, will perform in the HPER Building at 8:00 p.m. on Saturday, April 25. The event is sponsored by the Student Union Board and is free and open to the public.

McCollum has performed for more than 100 colleges and universities and has appeared twice on the Merv Griffin show. In 1978 he won the Third Annual San Francisco Stand-Up Comedy Competition with his uncanny impressions of munchkins, cartoon heroes and musical artists.

The 29-year old San Francisco native draws standing room only crowds in his hometown and in Los Angeles' Great American Music Hall. He specializes in cartoon character impressions and rock star impersonations.

His list of characters include Billy Joel, The Cars, Blondie, Elvis Presley, Mr. Rodgers, Julia Childs, Kermit the Frog, The Wicked Witch of the West, Glenda the Good Witch, Elmer Fudd, Daffy Duck, Led Zeppelin, Queen, and the Eagles.

AREA HYPNOTIST TO APPEAR AT ISUE. Lee Silen, a well-known motivational hypnotist, will appear again at ISUE on Wednesday, April 29. He will discuss various aspects of hypnosis, answer questions, and demonstrate the use of group hypnosis. The Student Union Board is sponsoring this event.

An Evansville resident, Silen says that he is not a "stage" hypnotist, and he does not claim to be either a psychologist or a doctor. He does however, help people to lose weight, to relieve pain, to retain information, or to stop smoking through motivational hypnosis. BUCYRUS-ERIE MAKES GRANT TO ISUE. The Bucyrus-Erie Foundation, on recommendation from Evansville plant manager, H. Donald Bryant, has made a grant of \$8,350 to ISUE. The grant will be used to acquire a hydraulic teaching module to be used in the engineering technology program at ISUE.

In making the presentation, Bryant said he hoped the equipment will further enhance the mechanical engineering technology program at ISUE. The equipment to be purchased is a Vega Fluid Power System III hydraulic test stand and accessories.

David L. Rice, President of Campus, said that Bucyrus-Erie has played a vital role in the brief history of the campus. In 1968, Bucyrus-Erie contributed \$15,000 in support of the purchase of the 1400 acres of property that is now the permanent home of the campus.

HUMANITIES FORUM. Dr. R.V. Schoder, of Loyola University, returns to ISUE on Thursday, April 23, to present a slide lecture on Alexander the Great. The lecture is sponsored by the Humanities Forum.

The legendary Alexander the Great of Macedonia (356 to 323 B.C.), whose conquests by the age of 33 embraced the then-known world, has generated an extraordinary amount of historical speculation. As a pupil of Aristotle and as a general steeped in the philosophies of Homer and Euripides, Alexander III had enormous impact on Western civilization.

A noted author, lecturer, and archaeologist, Schoder has amassed a collection of 12,000 slides during his visits to world museums, and these slides have appeared in over 150 books. A scholar of international scope, he has twice addressed the Inter-American Classical Conference at Rio de Janeiro and has spoken at the International Classical Conference in Bonn, Germany.

Dr. Schoder is one of the founders of the Indiana Classical Conference and of the Vergilian Society. He has also been professor-in-residence at the American School in Athens and at the University of Tokyo. He is now the president of the Chicago Society of the Archaeological Institute of America.
