**HOMECOMING ACTIVITIES THIS WEEK.** Homecoming activities continue this week before the ISUE men's basketball team meets St. Joseph's College on Saturday night, February 6. The theme "Breaking Away" was chosen for this year's homecoming by the Student Union Board.

Comedian Paul Reiser will present two shows in the Pyramid Lounge today between 11:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. On Thursday, February 4, a Trivia Quiz will begin at 11:00 a.m. in the Pyramid Lounge. This new event will continue on Friday, February 5, at 11:00 a.m. A Dating Game is also planned for that day and will begin at noon in the Pyramid Lounge.

On Saturday, a banner contest will be held in the HPER Building at 5:30 p.m. During the game's halftime, the Homecoming King and Queen will be presented. An alumni reception will be held immediately following the game in the pool area of the HPER Building. The University community is invited to the Homecoming Dance after the game which will be held in the University Dining Center. Admission is \$1.50 per person. Everyone is encouraged to attend all the events.

**TIME TO ORDER ACADEMIC REGALIA.** The 1982 Commencement will be held Saturday, May 8 at 9:00 a.m. in the Health, Physical Education and Recreation Building. The faculty handbook states that all faculty members are expected to participate in the Commencement Exercises and shall wear appropriate academic costume. Academic robes, caps and hoods may be ordered from the ISUE Bookstore. Dave Deering, Bookstore manager, says that regalia must be ordered during February to avoid errors and delays in shipment. Regalia may be picked up any time in April.

**INCLEMENT WEATHER POLICY FOR UNIVERSITY PERSONNEL.** At various times throughout the winter months, weather conditions may necessitate the cancelling of classes at ISUE. As a reminder, even though classes may be cancelled, University offices will remain open, and members of the administrative and clerical/support staff are expected to fulfill their University assignments. University employees are expected to report to work as usual. If an employee decides not to report to work or leaves work early due to weather conditions, the time missed should then be reported as vacation, convenience day, or leave without pay.

**WHO'S WHO AMONG STUDENTS IN AMERICAN UNIVERSITIES AND COLLEGES.** The 1981-82 edition of Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges will carry the names of eight students from Indiana State University Evansville who have been selected as being among the country's most outstanding campus leaders.

Selection of these students was based on their academic achievement, service to their communities, leadership in extracurricular activities, and future potential. They join an elite group of students selected from more than 1,300 institutions of higher learning in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, and several foreign nations. Outstanding students have been honored in the annual directory since it was first published in 1934.

COLLEGE INFORMATION AND FINANCIAL AID WORKSHOP SCHEDULED FOR FEBRUARY 7. ISUE will offer a free program, on choosing a college and financing a college education, for students considering college and for their parents. The program will be offered at 1:30 and 3:30 p.m. on Sunday, February 7 in AD126. According to Vice President for Administration Dr. Donald D. Bennett, the program is being offered in response to questions raised about the future of financial aid programs and the effect existing and proposed curtailment of federal financial aid programs will have on area students.

Students planning to attend college and apply for student financial aid for the 1982-83 academic year will likely see significant cuts in four of the most relied upon student aid programs and a tightening of eligibility for a fifth program.

The program is scheduled oneweek before the suggested deadline for students to mail the Financial Aid Form to the College Scholarship Service, which determines aid eligibility. Parents and students will receive assistance in properly completing those forms during the workshop.
