NEW HARMONY HOSTS COMMUNAL STUDIES CONFERENCE

The 20th annual meeting of the Communal Studies Association (CSA) and the Israel-based International Communal Studies Association (ICSA) will be held Thursday through Sunday, October 14-17, in Historic New Harmony.

Nearly 100 speakers from Australia, Canada, England, Holland, Israel, Japan, Poland, Spain, and the United States will present information on "Culture, Thought, and Living in Community." More than 200 are expected to attend the conference, which will open with tours and special exhibits on Thursday.

Dr. Donald E. Pitzer, USI professor of history, will discuss the two 19th century communal living experiments at New Harmony at the opening dinner session at 7 p.m. Thursday. **Dr. Pitzer** also is executive director of the USI Center for Communal Studies and the CSA, and is conference chairperson.

The University Theatre Department will host the 31st National Conference on Outdoor Drama Wednesday-Saturday, October 20-23, in Historic New Harmony. The four-day conference will cover all aspects of the genre, including a review of the '93 season, state-of-the-art box office techniques, exceptional marketing approaches, and an in-depth look at trends that will affect outdoor drama over the next five years.

Mr. Billy Edd Wheeler, Young Abe Lincoln playwright, will be a special guest and will showcase his music at the opening reception Wednesday evening. Young Abe, which is presented June through August in Lincoln Amphitheatre at Lincoln State Park, will be featured in Thursday's program. SPORTS THIS WEEK - Cross country to host Indiana Intercollegiate - USI men's and women's teams will host the Indiana Intercollegiate Cross Country Race on Friday, October 15, bringing the event to Evansville for the first time in its history. It previously was rotated among Indiana, Notre Dame, and Purdue universities until Notre Dame dropped out about four years ago. Indiana State has been the only other host besides IU and Purdue.
