LINCOLN BOYHOOD TO OBSERVE ANNIVERSARY. The Lincoln Boyhood National Memorial will celebrate the 25th anniversary of its establishment with a rededication program at 2 p.m. (CDT) Sunday, July 12. **Dr. Mark E. Neely, Jr.**, director of the Louis A. Warren Lincoln Library and Museum, will be the featured speaker. Other participants will include **Mr. William Penn Mott, Jr.**, director of the National Park Service; **Mr. William A. Koch** of Santa Claus; and Spencer County Circuit Court **Judge Wayne Roell**. Special exhibits and activities available Saturday and Sunday at the Memorial Visitor Center and Lincoln Living Historical Farm will include "Lincoln, His Family, and His Tragedy," an exhibit of rare Lincoln prints and lithographs; "Learn to Card and Spin" demonstrations of the pioneer arts; and the films, "Here I Grew Up" and "Pioneer Days in Indiana." Visitors are invited to stay for the Sunday evening performance of the "Young Abe Lincoln" outdoor drama at the 1,514-seat amphitheater in neighboring Lincoln State Park.

Lincoln Boyhood National Memorial preserves the Indiana farm where Abraham Lincoln lived for 14 years -- 1816 to 1830 -- and the site where his mother, Nancy Hanks Lincoln, is buried. Seating for 400 is available for the July 12 ceremonies. Late arrivals should bring lawn chairs. If there is inclement weather, the program will be held at Heritage Hills High School auditorium at Lincoln City.

NEW HARMONY FESTIVAL OF MUSIC. The 10th anniversary presentation of the New Harmony Festival of Music will get under way Sunday, July 26, with Mendelssohn's "Hymn of Praise" highlighting Evensong services at 4 and 6 p.m. in St. Stephen's Church. **Mr. William Toole** will conduct the services, which will feature the Harmonist Chorale and guest soloists and instrumentalists. Other programs during the next week will include:

Monday, July 27 -- **Mr. Jeff Bradetich** of Chicago, double bass player, will present a noon recital at Thrall's Opera House.

Tuesday, July 28 -- contralto **Jo Ann Pottoroff** will sing at a noon recital and **Pavlina Dokovska**, a Bulgarian pianist who played at New Harmony last spring, will play a return recital at 8 p.m. Both programs are at Thrall's Opera House.

Wednesday, July 29 -- Indianapolis-based jazz guitarist **Tony Byrne** will play at noon at Thrall's. The evening program, starting at 7 p.m., will take participants on a "Midsummer Night's Stroll," a walking tour of three of New Harmony's historic homes -- the David Lenz House, the Fauntleroy Home, and the 1830 House. There will be refreshments and vocal and (Early American) instrumental entertainment at each stop.

Thursday, July 30 -- the Evansville Clarinet Quartet will play at noon and bass-baritone **John Ostendorf** will present a recital with soprano **Frances Daniels** at 8 p.m., both at Thrall's.

Friday, July 31 -- the Evansville Community Children's Choir, directed by **Ms. Barbara Matzigkeit**, will present a concert at noon and the final 1987 concert at 8 p.m. will feature the Chicago Brass Quintet. Both are at Thrall's.

Saturday, August 1 -- a 10th Anniversary Ball will be held at 7 p.m. at the New Harmony Inn Conference Center, co-hosted by Historic New Harmony, Inc., the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art, and New Harmony State Memorials.

The Evensong service will be free but donations will be accepted; the "Midsummer Night's Stroll" will be \$6 per person; reservations for the 10th Anniversary Ball will be \$25 per person; admission to all other events will be \$7 for adults, \$6 for senior citizens and students; children age 12 and under will be admitted free. In conjunction with the festival, the New Harmony Inn is offering reduced rates for those staying five nights. For information or reservations, call (812) 682-3115.

"DIRTY WORKS" FINALE. New Harmony Theatre will present its final performances of "Dirty Works at the Crossroads," the musical melodrama designed for audience participation, at 8 p.m. Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, July 9-10-11, at Thrall's Opera House. The theatre company's next production, "Gin Game," will open Thursday, July 16, also at Thrall's. This is the funny, warm-hearted story of Weller and Fonia and his attempts to teach her to play gin rummy. Curtain time is 8 p.m. Thursday-Saturday and 2 p.m. Sunday.
