AWARDS PRESENTED FOR 12 FACULTY PROJECTS

A total of \$15,000 was awarded to 12 USI faculty projects for the 1992-93 Faculty Research and Creative Work Awards. The research grants, up one-third over the amount presented in 1991-92, are provided by the USI Foundation from contributions to the USI Annual Fund. Grant recipients include:

* **Mr. Michael K. Aakhus**, associate professor of art and chairperson of the Art and Music Department: "Native American Texts and Images." Mr. Aakhus collaborated with **Dr. Gordon Brotherston** of Indiana University, creating intaglio prints in a limited-edition fine art portfolio, illustrating Dr. Brotherston's work on a written record left by indigenous peoples of southern Mexico and parts of Central America.

* **Dr. Abbas Foroughi**, associate professor of computer information systems: "Costing Techniques in Labor/Management." Dr. Foroughi will investigate the types of employee wage-benefit costing being used by Tri-State businesses and determine ways they can be improved through innovative computer technology. A report will be issued and a series of seminars will be proposed through the Office of Continuing Education.

* **Mr. Augustine J. Fredrich**, professor of civil engineering technology and chair of the Engineering Technology Department: "Art for Engineers." Mr. Fredrich will produce an exhibit of work by Mr. Joseph Pennell, American artist, for display at the 1993 American Society of Civil Engineers national convention, as a follow-up to a "teaser" presented at the 1992 con-

vention. Mr. Pennell's prints depict some of the most important engineering projects of the late 19th and early 20th centuries; Mr. Fredrich ran across them in the Library of Congress in 1990, while doing research on another project.

Learn More About Your University

With the University growing by leaps and bounds, many employees feel out of touch with the rapid changes taking place. To help bring employees up-to-date on what is happening within the University, the Human Resource Department is setting up a series of discussions on current issues and future plans in various departments and schools.

Presentations will begin in May and be given twice a month to allow everyone an opportunity to attend. Anticipated dates are the second Tuesday and Wednesday of the month. These sessions will run about 90 minutes. Exact dates and times will be posted in University Notes prior to a presentation. The first sessions will be a report on the David L. Rice Library, available at 2 p.m. Tuesday, May 11, and 9:30 a.m. Wednesday, May 12, both in L100.

Faculty and administrative and clerical/support staff are encouraged to attend University Update presentations. Only by learning more about the University and what it has to offer will each of us be able to provide the quality service the students need and deserve while pursuing their education here at USI.

* **Dr. Clay D. Harris**, assistant professor of geology: "Aided Learning in Geosciences." Dr. Harris plans to purchase four software packages which will give students greater computer literacy, increased familiarity with the array of computer applications, and greater exposure to science concepts and their application. His project and research will conclude with submitting an article to the *Journal of Geological Education*.

* **Mrs. Deborah C. Henry**, assistant professor and Dental Hygiene Program director, and **Dr. Charles F. Petranek**, professor of sociology and chairperson of the Sociology/Anthropology Department: "Child Abuse Information." Because dental hygienists have a unique opportunity to detect this often private issue, the 213 U.S. dental hygiene programs will be surveyed to learn the extent that information on child abuse

detection and reporting is included in education process. Results will be presented to the Spring 1993 National Dental Educators Meeting and published in the *Journal of Dental Education*.

* **Dr. Joy Van Eck Peluchette**, assistant professor of management and marketing: "Complexities of Women's Careers." Dr. Peluchette's project has several purposes - to empirically test a model of women's career success and to examine whether selected personal, family, organizational, or societal factors influence career success; to examine how women define career success; and to examine whether women make tradeoffs and sacrifices in either work or personal life. Papers and articles will be submitted to various journals and meetings.

* **Dr. Charles L Price**, professor of science education: "Natural Beauty at USI." Dr. Price will continue a 1992 project of creating archival, quality photographs of natural life at USI, in part to provide documentation so that biological diversity is not lost as campus development continues.

* **Mr. Donald E. Purcell and Ms. Kathy V. Rodgers**, instructors in mathematics: "Graphics Calculator." The two instructors plan to develop materials to assist area high school mathematics teachers in using the relatively new graphics calculator to help students develop and reinforce mathematical ideas. The final product would be available to any Tri-State teacher, upon request.

* **Dr. Leslie J. Roberts**, assistant professor of French: "Translation of *Voyage en Icarie*." Dr. Roberts will provide the first professional English translation of M. Etienne Cabet's *Voyage en Icarie*. She expects to present a paper at the International Communal Studies Association Conference in October in New Harmony and will have a 500-page translation included in Syracuse University Press' "Utopian and Communitarian Series."

* **Dr. Daniel C. Scavone**, professor of history: "Travel to Specialized Research Archives." Dr. Scavone will visit this country's largest Shroud of Turin archive in Esopus, New York, to study and photocopy materials in the collection, using the materials in his continuing presentations on the shroud.

* **Dr. Marlene V. Shaw**, professor of biology: "Identifying a New Family of Proteins." The purpose of the project is two-fold: to engage in scholarly activity by participating in an ongoing research program and to master commonly used, but complex molecular biology techniques. Dr. Shaw will conduct a tightly focused search for a new family of proteins related to embryonic development of chickens, mice, and humans and report on the results in appropriate journals and meetings.

* **Dr. Peggy O. Shields**, assistant professor of management and marketing: "Service Requirements for Marketing Faculty." Dr. Shields will survey marketing faculty and practitioners to determine perceptions of community service requirements of the employer and value of marketing expertise in such activities.

ROPEWALK WRITERS RETREAT. May deadlines are set for participating in the fifth annual RopeWalk Writers Retreat June 13-19 in New Harmony. Mr. Tom Turner of Delaware, Ohio, respected potter of functional ware; **Ms. Janet Ayako Neuwalder** of Lexington, who transforms organic objects into ceramic metaphors

Mr. Paul Hermann of Evansville, a traditionally-trained woodcarver; **Mr. Phillip R. Tennant** of Indianapolis, who uses exotic woods and stone in his sleek furniture

Ms. Fiona R. Clark, who creates elegant glassware in Cleveland, Ohio; **Mr. William Carlson** of Urbana, Illinois, internationally known for his glass sculpture

Mr. William Duffy of Louisville, known for his figurative carvings in stone; **Ms. Ana England** of Cincinnati, who creates neo-classical sculptures of marble and other materials

Ms. Roberta Elliott of Cobden, Illinois, who twists steel into functional objects; **Ms. Myra Mimplitsch Gray** of Lafayette, who alters common objects into sculptural entities

Dr. Hilary A. Braysmith, assistant professor of art history, presented a paper entitled "The National School as Methodological Gauge: The Case of German Romanticism" at the Interdisciplinary 19th Century Studies Conference April 2 in Tempe, Arizona.

Dr. Braysmith also advised/sponsored Ms. Kristi Thomason, a USI student, at the annual Undergraduate Conference April 16 at Butler University, and will be a fellow at the National Endowment for the Humanities Institute on "Chinese Culture" this summer at the East-West Center in Honolulu.

Dr. Robert E. Gehring, associate professor of psychology, was senior author of four papers presented to the Eastern Psychological Association April 16-17 in Arlington, Virginia. The other two authors were USI students. The papers included: "The Development of Dual Coding and Picture Superiority in Recall" - children at about age five make an insightful discovery of verbal thinking (this research will be featured in an

upcoming issue of the *APA Monitor*); "Use of Text and Video to Teach a Procedural Task" -- Navy personnel react better to modeling than print or audio instruction to learn a job effectively; "An Evaluation of the 'Think First' Injury Prevention Program" -- a Deaconess Hospital program was successful in increasing safe practices and promoting knowledge about accident prevention in high schoolers; and "Recall of Symbols vs. Words" -- college students remember concepts better through symbols, rather than printed words.

Dr. Peggy F. Harrel, coordinator of Grants and Sponsored Research, was appointed to a two-year term as Women's Issues chairperson on the Board of Directors for the Indiana Division of the American Association of University Women. She attended the state convention April 24-25 in Vincennes.

Dr. Susanna Hoeness-Krupsaw, instructor in English, was honored as a "star volunteer" during the Regional Reading Aid's annual dinner and awards night April 17. She has been a Regional Reading Aid volunteer for five years.

Dr. Robert E. Mays, associate dean of the School of Education and Human Services, has been selected to chair the 1993 Whirlpool Scholarship Competition. Five students from a pool of 52 Tri-State candidates will be selected to receive \$12,000 scholarships. Competition finals will be held at USI in early May.

Dr. Daniel C.
