FEATURED SPEAKERS FOR AMERICAN ISSUES FORUM. Jeffrey Marston, Community Development Director, Office of the Mayor, Evansville, will be the featured speaker in the ISUE American Issues class for October 8, 1975. His topic will be "The Sprawling City," and he will focus on problems of urban growth and planning versus free enterprise.

Mr. Marston is one in a series of speakers in the ISUE class, American Issues: The Challenge of the Revolution, developed in conjunction with a nationwide project in observance of the American Bicentennial. Individual sessions of the class are open to the public at no charge. A speaker is featured each Wednesday evening at 6:00 p.m. in Room Al26.

Carolyn Scruggs, Director of Operation City Beautiful, will be the featured speaker October 15, discussing "Use and Abuse in the Land of Plenty."

1975 FALL FESTIVAL - 54TH YEAR. The West Side Nut Club's 54th annual Fall Festival opened on Monday, October 6 and will run through Saturday, October 11. Some of the scheduled events for the Festival include tug of war, queen contest, kiddie festival, rides, concessions, window displays, professional entertainment, amateur shows, the pet parade, the whisker contest, and the main parade.

All of the activity is taking place on Franklin Street, where the merchants' windows are decorated in the "Festival of Nostalgia" theme. Borrowing from the past and looking to the future, the West Side Nut Club has planned another great Festival for all to enjoy!

HUMANITIES FORUM. The Humanities Division is sponsoring a weekly speakers series on Fridays. The series, the Humanities Forum, emphasizes subjects that bear upon or deserve the attention of humanists of all disciplines. At 1:00 p.m. in the Library Rare Books Room on October 10, John Gottcent, Associate Professor of English, will elaborate on "The Beatles: Ten Years After." This is a sequel to last year's Forum talk entitled "Rock 'n Roll: The Very Beginnings." Dr. Gottcent will reassess the significance of the Beatles from the perspective of 1975. The emphasis will be on the group's development and their impact on popular culture. The Humanities Forum is open to the public.

SONGWRITER AND SINGER TO BE ON CAMPIS. The Student Union Board is sponsoring songwriter and singer, Dick Feller, on campus for three performances on October 15. The noon performance is free to students and the community, although a small fee will be charged for the evening performances at 9:00 p.m. and 10:30 p.m. in the Pyramid Lounge of the University Center.

Mr. Feller belongs to the generation of Southern musicians who view their approach as progressive, both in content and in objective, namely the creation of a broader, younger audience for new Southern music. He traces his own musical growth from Jimmie Rodgers, Hank Williams, Merle Travis, and Chet Atkins, through blues stalwarts like Howlin' Wolf and Jimmy Reed, progressive jazz, mainstream pop, rock 'n roll and then, coming full circle, key country artists and writers of recent years.

In addition to writing, Mr. Feller has worked as a session guitarist on dates for Warner Mack, Skeeter Davis, Mel Tillis, and Stu Phillips. Among the Feller songs first recorded by Nashville artists were "Boston," "Santa Barbara Gold," "Morning Blue," "Any Ole Wind That Blows," and "Lord Mr. Ford," the latter two songs providing hits for Johnny Cash and Jerry Reed respectively. The general public is invited to attend.

PROFESSIONAL GROUNDS MAINTHWANCE SCHOOL. A professional Grounds Maintenance School is being offered for local grounds maintenance personnel by the Vander-burgh County Cooperative Extension Service and Purdue University, in cooperation with Indiana State University Evansville, Office of Continuing Education and Operation City Beautiful, Evansville Metropolitan Chamber of Commerce on October 16 and 17 at Indiana State University Evansville.

PROFESSIONAL GROUNDS MAINTENANCE SCHOOL, CONTINUED. Topics to be covered in the two-day school are Turf Varieties for Southwestern Indiana, Turf Fertilizing Programs, Turf Watering Programs, Pruning Ornamentals, Planting Ornamentals, Chemical Weed Control, Pesticide Control Act, Turf Disease Control, Ornamental Diseases, Weed Control in Woody Ornamentals, Turf Herbicides, Turf Insect Control, and Ornamental Insect Control. There will be no registration fee. Interested persons are to contact the Office of Continuing Education.

LIRPARY GIFT. The Evansville AAUW Chapter has presented a \$50.00 check to the ISUE Library for purchase of books, according to Charles Lonnberg, Director of Library.

BUE CROSS-BUE SHIELD OPEN EMPOLIMENT. University employees who wish to enroll in Blue Cross-Blue Shield may do so no later than November 26, 1975. If enrollment does not occur during the first 31 days of employment, it may occur only during open enrollment each November. Employees may enroll in this optional medical-hospital insurance coverage at the Personnel Office, Room 101A. Employees may enroll in the family plan at a cost of \$18.00 a month, or the single plan for \$6.50 per month. The University contributes \$22.60 per month for a family plan and \$7.70 per month for the single plan. Once enrollment in Blue Cross-Blue Shield is made, employees will then be eligible for Major Medical-Dental, which is also optional.

PEOPLE IN THE NEWS.

CHARLES T. BARBER, Associate Professor of Political Science, has been selected to go on a six-week study tour of India. From December 26, 1975 to February 7, 1976, Dr. Barber will be traveling in two states of southern India, Maharashtra and Andhra Pradesh, staying with families in such cities as Nagpur, Hyderabad, and Kakinada.

District 658 (Southern Indiana) of Rotary International has selected four other young men from different southern Indiana cities (Bloomington, Columbus, Mitchell, and Salem) to serve as a group study exchange team under supervision of Mr. Mark Elrod, New Albany. Upon return, members of the study team will be responsible for presenting written reports and slide lectures about their experiences in India.

JOHN M. BARNES, Assistant Professor of Geology and Geography, and author of "Choices for Survival," a straight-forward booklet on the energy crisis, was interviewed by The Gleaner, Henderson, Kentucky, in the September 23 issue. On his examination of economy and ecology, Mr. Barnes stated that "conservation must become a way of life, if not through voluntary action or economic incentives, then through legislation and economic planning -- the earth on which we live has finite and exhaustible resources."

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PEOPLE IN THE NEWS, CONTINUED.

WALTER A. HOPKINS, Associate Professor of Sociology, has been notified that an ISUE project, "Crime Control, Limitations on Civil Liberties?" has been funded by the Indiana Commission on the Humanities. This project, directed by Dr. Hopkins and undertaken in connection with the Evansville Bicentennial Commission, will provide a series of four public forums, on the four Tuesday evenings in November, in which attention will be given to the various ways in which crime control legislation might impinge upon fundamental civil liberties. Southwestern Indiana Civil Liberties Union and Public Action in Correctional Effort (PACE) are co-sponsors with ISUE in this series of forums.

In the October 1, 1975, issue of the periodical, <u>Library Journal</u>, two book reviews appeared which were written by *CHARLES M. LONNBERG*, Director of the Library and Professor of Library Science. The two new books are being released for sale this month and are entitled <u>Upton Sinclair</u>, <u>American Rebel</u>, by Leon Harris, and <u>The Science Fiction Book</u>, an illustrated history, by Franz Rottensteiner.

The English Department is sending a representative, in the person of *Dr. Thomas Rivers*, to present aspects of its new composition program to members of the English area at Kentucky Wesleyan University. The conference will be held on Friday, October 10, 1975 on the KWU campus.
