USI courses available in Tell City via distance education

USI will offer spring semester courses in Tell City beginning January 8, 2001, using Indiana's newest distance learning technologies. The Schergens Center, 1140 31st Street, will be the site for the courses.

USI academic programs offered at the center are nursing, health services, and communications, as well as courses in advertising, economics, political science, English, psychology, and theatre. Workforce training programs for business and industry also will be offered at the center. Courses will be available through videoconferencing, the Internet, and videotape.

Distance education is offered through the USI Learning Network and information about the program is available at www.usi.edu/distance or by calling 800/813-4238.

An information session and tour of the Schergens Center will be offered from 1 - 3 p.m. and 5 - 7 p.m. EST on Tuesday, December 12, at the center for those interested in the distance education program. Spring semester class schedules will be available, and at 2 p.m. and again at 6 p.m. a two-way video conference with USI staff will be presented for people interested in participating in the distance education program.

Guided trip to England

Dr. Sherry Darrell, professor of English, and Dr. Robert Darrell, professor of English at Kentucky Wesleyan University, will lead an educational tour of England from July 18 to August 1, 2001. The cost for a single ticket is \$2,835; \$2,455 each for two. The cost includes round-trip airfare from Louisville, hotel accommodations, site seeing tours and transfers by private coach, a full English breakfast, and a three-course dinner every evening, served in the hotel.

Participants on this 15-day trip will begin site seeing in London and journey as far north as York, visiting Kent, Brighton, North Wales, and more. The tour participants will explore famous sites in London such as the Tower of London, Westminster Abbey, and Buckingham Palace, as well as great churches, cathedrals, and other modern sites.

Road trips will encompass other parts of England including such historical sites as Stonehenge, Canterbury Cathedral,

Crystal Palace, and Dover Castle. Participants will visit Roman baths in Bristol and enjoy full day tours of Snowdonia National Park and North Wales. Free time is scheduled throughout the trip for personal interests, golf, and shopping.

"The group will see important manuscripts and artifacts as well as enjoy varied drama and architecture," said Dr. Sherry Darrell. "Bob and I have led groups of students and adults over the past 10 years to England, Canada, France, and Italy, so we're seasoned travelers and know how to make every second count."

Interested persons may earn course credit for the trip by enrolling in English 450; English 550 if a graduate student. A reading list will be assigned for the trip.

NEH 2001 summer seminars and institutes

Each year, the National Endowment for the Humanities Division of Education Programs offers teachers opportunities to study humanities topics in a variety of summer seminars and institutes. The dates and durations of each project vary. The application deadline for summer seminars and institutes is March 1, 2001.

Institutes provide intensive collaborative study of texts, topics, and ideas central to undergraduate teaching in the humanities under the guidance of faculties distinguished in their fields of scholarship. Institutes aim to prepare participants to return to their classrooms with a deeper knowledge of current scholarship in key fields of the humanities.

The program awards are \$2,800, \$3,250, or \$3,700 depending on the length of the seminar or institute. The award covers the cost of travel, books, other research expenses, and living expenses. Each seminar includes 15 participants working in collaboration with one or two leading scholars. Participants will have access to a major library collection and time to pursue individual research and study projects.

For detailed eligibility requirements, applicants should consult the written application materials. First consideration for the seminars and institutes will be given to applicants who have not participated in an NEH-supported seminar or institute in the last three years.
