ISUE THEATRE SEASON TO BEGIN FRIDAY NIGHT. The ISUE Theatre will open its 1981-82 season with a collection of five one-act plays on Friday, October 2. "Short Stuff" is the collective title for the five plays which will begin at 8:00 p.m. at the ISUE Theatre, 3001 Igleheart. According to Director of Theatre Doug Hubbell, "One-act plays have several advantages. An event such as "Short Stuff" provides more performance opportunities to talented actors and actresses than would participation in a single show during the fall. Traditionally, one-act plays have been a testing ground for performers and writers alike. 'Short Stuff' is being done with this in mind. It should provide audiences with an enjoyable variety of viewing material."

OPEN ENROLLMENT GROUP HEALTH INSURANCE COVERAGE. Effective October 1, 1981, the University health insurance program for base plan and major medical/dental coverages has been combined with Blue Cross-Blue Shield as the carrier. All participants will have the complete health insurance coverage including major medical/dental benefits.

PEOPLE IN THE NEWS. Dr. Darrel Bigham, professor of history, participated in the Newberry Library Institute (in Chicago) on Quantitative History, on September 14 - 18. The institute, which was designed to introduce historians to the use of statistics and computers in research and teaching, invited twelve persons to participate.

Dr. Andrew Jorgensen, associate professor of chemistry, and Drs. Agni Kosmas and Eric Gislason have written a paper entitled "Expansion of the Classical Differential Cross Section in a Fourier Series". The paper was published in the Journal of Chemical Physics in September, 1981.

Dr. Robert Mays, director of field experiences and coordinator of graduate studies, and Dr. Charles Bertram, chairman of the Division of Education, recently received word that their article entitled "Teaching the Gifted and Talented" has been accepted for publication and will appear in the Illinois Schools Journal (spring edition).

Dr. Donald E. Pitzer, professor of history, has announced that the ISUE Center for Communal Studies has begun distribution of the first volume of a new scholarly journal titled Communal Studies. This journal is the official organ of the National Historic Communal Societies Association which is based at ISUE with Dr. Pitzer as executive director and Dr. Charles F. Petranek, associate professor of sociology, as treasurer. The 88-page Communal Societies was edited by Dr. T. Wayne Beasley at Murray State University and contains book reviews and articles on past and present communes by scholars in geography, anthropology, sociology, and history. Copies are available in the Division of Social Science for \$5.00 each.

An article, "Minimal Brain Dysfunction: Differences in Cognitive Organization in Two Groups of Index Cases and Their Relatives" by Dr. Sandra Singer, assistant professor of psychology, and two co-authors, has been published in the October, 1981 issue of Journal of Learning Disabilities.
