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SPRING EXECUTIVE-IN-RESIDENCE ANNOUNCED. Mr. Robert E. Griffin, chairman of the board of Indian Industries, Inc., and president and chief executive officer of Escalade, Inc., will serve as the USI Division of Business Executive-in-Residence on Thursday, April 3, in the University Conference Center. The program will include coffee and donuts at 9 a.m.; discussion sessions at 9:30 a.m. and 1 p.m.; and luncheon at 12 noon, with Mr. Griffin to be the speaker. The program is designed to stimulate students' thinking and to broaden their education through discussion and interaction with executives in business, industry, and government. It is being incorporated into the Community of Scholars series initiated this year to commemorate USI's attainment of full university status.

All sessions are open to the public. The discussion sessions are free; the luncheon cost is \$5 and reservations may be made with the Division of Business, extension 1718, by Thursday, March 27.

Mr. Griffin is a mechanical engineering graduate of Notre Dame University and earned an M.B.A. from Northwestern University. Prior to joining Indian Industries in 1963, he was employed by IBM and also served as general manager of General Meters, Inc., in Colorado. He is a director of American Mutual Liability Insurance Company and the Irwin Company and is a partner in Wendy's of Salt Lake City. He has been active in civic and community groups and currently is a director of Evansville's Future, Inc., the Advisory Council for the Evansville Center for Medical Education, and the Lay Advisory Board of St. Mary's Medical Center. He is past director of Leadership Evansville, Catholic Charities of Evansville, Evansville Museum of Arts and Science, and United Way of Southwestern Indiana. He received the Evansville Jaycees 1970 Distinguished Service Award and the 1971 Man of the Year Award from the Tri-State Notre Dame Club, which he has served as president.

community of scholars presents clard. Mr. John Ciardi, noted poet, etymologist, critic, and translator, and Mr. Philip Hagemann, composer and conductor, are combining their talents to present two concerts of happy, humorous family entertainment on Sunday, March 23 at Thrall's Opera House, New Harmony. The concerts will be presented at 3:30 and 7:30 p.m., with a

reception for Mr. Ciardi and Mr. Hagemann to be held at the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art following the afternoon performance. Concert tickets are half price, \$2.50, for USI students, faculty, and staff, and are available in the USI Division of Humanities.

Mr. Ciardi will be at USI the following three days, March 24-26. He will meet with Humanities classes and have lunch with students each day and will give a public lecture at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, March 25, in Forum I, entitled "Why Read?" A reception will follow. In addition, Mr. Ciardi will be featured in an autograph reception at 11 a.m. Wednesday, March 26, at the USI Bookstore, where his books are available.

Mr. Ciardi has taught at Kansas City University, Harvard, and Rutgers. With time out for World War II combat service as an aerial gunner flying B-29 missions from Saipan to Japan, he taught for 21 years, then resigned to try other things. He was host of the old CBS program, Accent, in 1961-62. He later was poetry editor of the Saturday Review and the author of a much-acclaimed weekly column called "Manner of Speaking" for several years. A number of those columns were collected by Rutgers University Press in a book titled Manner of Speaking, and J. B. Lippincott published Dialogue with an Audience, a compilation of his various critical and often controversial full-length articles for Saturday Review.

Mr. Ciardi, who lives in New Jersey and Key West, Florida, has published 14 volumes of poetry, 12 of poetry for children, two widely used textbooks on poetry, and the now standard English translation of Dante's <u>Divine Comedy</u>, of which the paperback, <u>Inferno</u>, has sold more than three million copies. His most recent obsession has been etymology. In 1980, Harper and Row released his very well received <u>A Browser's Dictionary</u>; in 1983, it released <u>A Second Browser's Dictionary</u>; he plans a third and fourth. His weekly word chats, a feature on National Public Radio, are picked up by more than 220 affiliated stations across the country.
