



## CASE PROGRAM TO BE REPEATED

USI will repeat Career Awareness in Science and Engineering (CASE), a five-week summer program introducing middle school students to the excitement of careers in science and engineering while enhancing basic problem-solving skills. The program begins Monday, June 22, and continues through Wednesday, July 29.

Mr. Augustine J. Fredrich, CASE director and USI chairperson of Engineering Technology, said efforts must be made to increase interest in science and engineering careers in southern Indiana. He cited a career survey conducted by the Buffalo Trace Council, Boys Scouts of America, which drew nearly 30,000 responses from southern Indiana students in grades 8 through 11. Medicine was the only science-related career in the top 15 choices and it ranked 14th. "The next highest science or engineering career field attracted fewer than 150 responses," Mr. Fredrich said. That field was electrical engineering.

"Local industry has offered their services and facilities, to help us meet their demand for employees with degrees in science and engineering," he added.

CASE, modeled after a similar program offered in San Antonio, stimulates interest in careers in science and engineering, provides insight into the skills and knowledge necessary for a successful career in science or engineering, and promotes greater success in preparing for such careers by providing academic enrichment in mathematics and problem solving and emphasis on study skills.

USI initiated CASE in 1991 with financial support from George Koch Sons, Inc., Bristol-Myers Squibb, Evansville banks, and 12 other Evansville area employers of scientists and engineers. USI has received two grants for this year's program -- \$18,792 awarded by the Indiana Commission for Higher Education through the Eisenhower Mathematics and Science Education Program, a federal program to generate more

Students completing sixth, seventh, and eighth grades are eligible to participate, with 40 to be selected. The registration fee is \$100; financial assistance is available, if needed. Writing Program at Goddard College, she currently teaches in the Warren Wilson College M.F.A. program. She has been affiliated with writers conferences at Aspen, Bread Loaf, and Indiana University, and is a recipient of grants from the National Endowment for the Arts and The Guggenheim Foundation.

*Menagerie* will open Season '92 on June 12, running through July 4. It will be followed by the comedy, *Lend Me a Tenor*, by Mr. Ken Ludwig, July 10-August 1. Mr. John Pielmeier's *Agnes of God* will close the season, running August 7-23. All will be presented in Murphy Auditorium.

In addition, a special series will be initiated in Thrall's Opera House for Season '92. Ms. Barbara Bates Smith and Mr. Mark Hunter will return to New Harmony to recreate *Ivy Rowe*, June 26-July 12, and Mr. David Lively will portray one of America's most celebrated authors in *Alias Mark Twain: A Visit with Samuel Clemens*, July 24-August 9.

The highly acclaimed New Harmony Theatre is one of the fastest growing regional theatres in the country.
