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ROBERT BARON TO KEYNOTE FIRST PSYCHOLOGY RESEARCH CONFERENCE AT ISUE.
Dr. Robert Baron, a prominent social psychologist who in 1976 was recipient of one of Senator William Proxmire's Golden Fleece Awards, will keynote the first Tri-State Undergraduate Psychology Research Conference at ISUE on Saturday, March 20.

Baron's speech is entitled "Fleeced But Not Shorn: Reality, Science and the U.S. Senate". He will recount his experience with the Proxmire award and tell how that award changed his perceptions about public support for science and the obligations scientists have to explain their research. Baron has undertaken to warn researchers that they should not take public support for granted and that they should close the communication gap between science and the general public. He feels scientists have an obligation "to describe our research clearly and in terms that people who are not in science can understand".

The "Fleece Award" was given to Baron for research he was doing on how environmental factors affect human aggression. The project was funded with a National Science Foundation grant and included research on riots, civil disorders, and the effect of heat on human aggression. As one small part of the project, researchers studied how drivers reacted to delays in traffic and whether their behavior and irritability varied on warm or cool days or varied among drivers of air-conditioned and non-air-conditioned cars. It was this smaller project on which Senator Proxmire focused and deemed wasteful spending of federal money.

Baron has been a faculty member at Purdue since 1971 and was made a full professor in 1975. He has held visiting professorships at Princeton University, the University of Minnesota, and the University of Texas at Austin. His academic degrees in psychology are from Brooklyn College where he earned the Bachelor of Science in 1964 and from the University of Iowa where he received the Master of Arts in 1967 and the Doctor of Philosophy in 1968. He is a prolific writer in the field of social psychology, having authored ten books and numerous articles in professional journals.

In 1979, Baron took a two-year leave from his position as professor of psychology at Purdue to become program director for social and developmental psychology at the National Science Foundation in Washington.
