

Technology comes to utopia

Experts to speak at Enlow Policy Forum

Two leading experts, scholars, and researchers will be the featured speakers at the Enlow Policy Forum, "Technology and Utopia: A View from New Harmony," Saturday, March 31, at the Rapp Granary in New Harmony, Indiana. The topic is one of scientific and national interest.

Dr. George Bugliarello, chancellor of Polytechnic University, Brooklyn, New York, will lecture on "Biology, Society, and Machines" at 9 a.m. and **Dr. Michael Conneally**, distinguished professor at the Indiana University School of Medicine, Indianapolis, Indiana, will discuss "The Human Genome Project and the Future" at 1 p.m.

An engineer and educator, Bugliarello's background ranges from fluid mechanics to computer languages, biomedical engineering, and science policy.

"George has the intellectual ability to talk about complex issues in a way that the general audience can understand. He has a wide view of the world. His lecture will be informative and inspirational," said **Mr. A. Jay Fredrich**, associate dean of the Pott School of Science and Engineering Technology, who has known Bugliarello for 30 years.

Prior to Polytechnic University, Bugliarello was dean of engineering at the University of Illinois in Chicago, and earlier, chairman of the Graduate Biotechnology program and professor of biotechnology and civil engineering at Carnegie-Mellon University. He holds a Doctor of Science degree in engineering from MIT.

He is founder and co-editor of *Technology In Society - An International Journal*; is interim editor-in-chief of *The Bridge*, the quarterly publication of the National Academy of Engineering; has written more than 200 professional papers;

and is the author and co-author or editor of numerous books.

Bugliarello also is a member of the National Academy of Engineering, a member of the Council on Foreign Relations, and is one of two U.S. members of the Science for Peace Steering Committee of the Scientific Affairs Division of NATO.


In 1975, he spearheaded the creation of Metrotech, the university-industry park that surrounds Polytechnic University. Metrotech is the largest urban university-industry park in the United States.

Conneally's research interests include the mapping of complex inherited diseases. His major interests include the study of Huntington's disease, genetics of alcoholism, diabetes, and bipolar disorders. He has been instrumental in mapping approximately 20 human genes in the past two decades.

He received his B.S. from the University College in Dublin, Ireland, and his M.S. and Ph.D. from the University of Wisconsin. Conneally is certified by the American Board of Medical Genetics and is a founding fellow of the American College of Medical Genetics.



After a decade of searching for the Huntington's disease gene, his work identified 20 percent of the human genome. In 1980 he began collaborating in a search for the Huntington's disease gene using recombinant DNA markers.

In 1983 the gene was located on chromosome 4, and in 1984 the International Congress of Human Genetics added the discovery to its list of the 40 most important advances in human genetics.

The same collaborative team also searched for a gene linked to familial

Alzheimer's disease and found it on chromosome 21. Conneally identified a second gene for familial Alzheimer's disease in 1987, and as a result of that work, was chosen to establish and direct a national roster for the study of familial Alzheimer's disease.

In 1991, Conneally was selected as the Irwin Research awardee, Indiana University Purdue University Indianapolis's highest recognition of faculty research accomplishments. He has written and collaborated on more than 350 abstracts and publications and serves as editor of five scientific journals.

The Enlow Policy Forum is free and open to the public. The goal of the forum is to encourage careful examination of issues, stimulate broad public discussion, and inspire action toward community progress. It is designed to enhance the educational goals of college students at University of Southern Indiana and University of Evansville, and augment professional goals and enrichment of interested individuals. Established by Susan Enlow, the forum is named in memory of her parents, Robert and Rossanna Enlow.

Tours begin

A new season of Historic New Harmony tours will begin Thursday, March 15. The educational tours explore the New Harmony area, settled by two 19th century groups, the Harmonists and the Owen/Maclure community.

In 1814 the Harmony Society purchased land and sought to create a utopian society. In 1824, the Harmonists sold the entire town to Welsh-born social reformer Robert Owen and philanthropist William Maclure, who gathered scholars, scientists, and educators, and brought them to New Harmony.

The tour lasts one day, but is split into morning and afternoon sessions. The morning tour focuses on the Harmonist period, while the Owen/Maclure period is covered during the afternoon. The tours will continue through December 30.

"We love to have children attend our tours. They are always welcome," said Ms. Kate Linderman, manager of development and public programs.

Tour rates are \$8 for adults, \$4.50 for children. Family passes are \$20, senior citizens \$7. Tours for USI students and employees are free with a valid Eagle Access Card.

Web tips

In an effort to improve navigation, Mr. Scott Klassen, Web support coordinator in Web Services, has installed a new search engine on the USI Web site. The "Google" search engine will search the entire USI Web site, including those areas on separate servers. The search engine is located at www.usi.edu/compctr/search.htm.

Users may enter a keyword or keywords and choose to search either the USI Web site or the entire World Wide Web.

"This engine is not limited to 500 pages as was the case with the last one, and Google is one of the most widely used search engines today," Klassen said.

Center to open with special event



Facility hours will be from 6 a.m. to 10:30 p.m. Mondays through Thursdays, from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. Fridays, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturdays, and from noon to 5 p.m. Sundays. Students, faculty, and staff may access the facility with a valid Eagle Access Card. Employees using the facility will not be charged this semester. However, fees may be applied in the future.

The ribbon-breaking celebrates the conclusion of Phase I of a three-phase fitness and recreation facilities expansion on campus. The new facility will replace the off-campus Student Fitness Center located in the University Village Shopping Center.

Tours will be available following the ribbon-breaking ceremony and healthy refreshments will be served.

Vanderbilt dean to lecture on financial market reform

Dr. William G. Christie, professor of finance and dean of business at Vanderbilt University, will deliver the lecture, "Financial Market Reform and Innovation," at 7 p.m., Thursday, March 22, at Carter Hall in the University Center.

Christie gained national prominence in 1994, when he co-wrote and published the article, "Why Do Nasdaq Market Makers Avoid Odd-Eighth Quotes," in the *Journal of Finance*. According to a report in *Barron's*, during the five years following its publication, the article led to increased security measures at Nasdaq costing more than \$100 million, SEC fines of \$26.3 million against 28 trading firms, and settlement of a \$1.03 billion class-action lawsuit on behalf of investors overcharged by dealers.

A member of the Economic Advisory Board at the National Association of Securities Dealers, Christie's research has been published in a variety of academic journals, including the *Journal of Financial Economics*, the *Journal of Finance*, and the *Journal of Business*. He serves as an associate editor of the *Review of Financial Studies* and as co-editor of the *Journal of Financial Intermediation*. He also has appeared on Marketplace Radio, CNBC's Inside Opinion and Market Wrap, the Wall Street Journal Report, and CNN's Inside Business.

His lecture, presented by the School of Business, is part of USI's Distinguished Lecture Series program, which is free and open to the public. A reception will follow.

NEH updates grant application instructions

The Office of Graduate Studies and Sponsored Research has received a new book of application instructions for the National Endowment for the Humanities 2000-2001 Grant Programs.

The book makes application for an NEH grant easier. In this book, and also on the NEH Web site (www.neh.gov), you can identify the program to match your project and find guidelines describing how to apply for a grant, forms required for the application, and information on how to contact the endowment for assistance.

The first step in applying for a grant is to identify where your project fits within the NEH programs. Programs are administered by four divisions and one office: Education Programs, Preservation and Access, Public Programs, Research

Programs, and the Office of Challenge Grants.

If you are a citizen of the United States or a U.S. territory, or are a foreign national who has lived in the United States or a U.S. territory for at least three years immediately preceding an application, you are eligible to apply for a grant. Nonprofit organizations are eligible for funding as well as state and local governments. IRS tax-exempt status is required for grants in the divisions of Education Programs, Public Programs, and Research Programs. You will need to check the guidelines of a specific program for any other special requirements.

Names in the news

Achievements

Dr. Karen H. Bonnell, director of Instructional Technology Services and associate professor of communications, will have an article published in the spring 2001 edition of the refereed journal, *Technology: Teaching and Research in the Humanities*. The article, *Guidelines for Online Education: The SELFC Approach*, provides an analysis of distance education guidelines along broad categories that include student services, evaluation and assessment, library and learning resources, facilities and finances, and curriculum and instruction.

Dr. Jim Durbin, assistant professor of geology and physics, and several geology students will present the results of class-based research at the North Central section meeting of the Geological Society of America, Monday and Tuesday, April 23 and 24, in Bloomington/Normal, Illinois.

The group will present a poster session entitled "Stratigraphy and Sedimentology of the Alluvial Floor of Wesley Chapel Gulf, Orange County, Indiana," the result of a semester-long research project last fall, and an oral presentation of the abstract "Holocene Stratigraphy and Geomorphology of the Lower Nueces River Valley," based on research funded by a creative research and teaching grant through USI.

Participating geology students included Ryan C. Jones, Brendan Anslinger, Danise Guy, and Kelly Sanders.

Mr. Larry D. Goss, professor of engineering technology, has been named this year's recipient of the Orthogonal Medal, an award made annually by North Carolina State University to honor an individual for lifetime contributions to the profession of graphic communications.

Goss has been teaching engineering graphics and computer-aided design since 1963, has been an active member of the Engineering Design Graphics Division of the American Society for Engineering Education since 1967, and was instrumental in establishing the International Society for Graphics and Geometry in 1992. He also has served as a national and international officer of these societies.

During his career, Goss has written numerous technical papers, two textbooks, and several workbooks. He also developed a number of teaching aids to help students learn the principles of visualization and engineering documentation, including an orthographic projection simulator, a coded stacked block technique for describing three-dimensional objects, three-dimensional multiple viewport cursors for CAD systems, and a general graphical solution to the Pythagorean theorem.

While under contract to the Bendix Corporation in 1969, Goss developed the first completely computerized database of electrical and electronic symbols for generating schematic diagrams of electrical circuits.

Goss and his wife Rena will travel to Raleigh, North Carolina, to receive the award on Saturday, April 21.

Dr. Susanna Hoeness-Krupsaw, assistant professor of English, presented a paper titled "E. L. Doctorow's *City of God: New Answers to Old Questions*" in February at the 29th annual Twentieth-Century Literature Conference in Louisville, Kentucky.

Mrs. Carolyn Roth, special part-time instructor in art, is exhibiting her linocut print "Private Rooms" in "The Fourteenth Annual Women's Works, 2001" exhibition. The national juried show opened March 1 and will continue through April 29 at Old Court House Arts Center in Woodstock, Illinois.
