1979 ISUE STUDENT ART EXHIBITION.

The 1979 ISUE Student Art Exhibition began April 22 and will continue through April 29, featuring art work ranging from painting drawing, and printmaking to sculpture, ceramics, jewelry and wood.

Richard Hay, associate professor of art and ceramics at Indiana State University, judged the show on Sunday. He is president of the National Council on Education

in the Ceramic Arts and has given over 90 lecture-workshops in the United States and Japan.

Over \$1700.00 in the form of merit prizes and tuition scholarships were awarded to winning art works. The "Best of Show" award went to Christine Reising for all of her works. She also won the ISUE "Campus Collection Purchase" award for her piece "Love Maketh Not Ashamed," done in all mediums.

The Student Exhibit is open to the public weekdays from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Saturday from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and Sunday from 11:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

HUMANITIES FORUM. On May 1, just three days before the ninth anniversary of the Kent State shootings, the Occidental College (Los Angeles) Readers Theatre will present a multi-media performance based on the Kent State incident, for the ISUE Humanities Forum.

"Kent State: A Requiem" was written by Occidental forensics professor Greg Payne who will also perform. It is a dramatic examination of the events surrounding the Kent State shootings of 1970.

Slides taken at the time of the incident and music from Verdi's "Requiem" will be part of the group's touring production.

POETRY READING AT ISUE. On April 30, Poet Jon Anderson will read from his own work for the ISUE Humanities Forum.

One of the finest readers of contemporary poetry, Anderson has published three works with the University of Pittsburgh Press: Looking for Jonathan, Death and Friends, and In Sepia. A former nominee for the National Book Award, Anderson was the recipient of Guggenheim Grant this year and is currently teaching graduate classes at the University of Tucson.

WOMEN AS SEEN THROUGH FILM DISCUSSION SERIES. ISUE's "University Outreach: The Many Images of Women as Seen Through Film," is featuring the film A Brief Vacation as the third of a series of film/discussion programs.

A Brief Vacation portrays a woman prematurely aged from working and a family life of drudgery. When it is discovered that she has tuberculosis, she is sent to a mountain sanatorium. There, in a place of disease and death, she discovers clean air, peace, self-respect, and finally love.
