USI NAMED OUTSTANDING EMPLOYER BY PIC

The Private Industry Council (PIC) honored the University of Southern Indiana as "Outstanding Employer of the Year" among businesses with more than 100 employees in an awards ceremony September 27 at the Petroleum Club.

This was the sixth year that PIC has presented awards to employers in three categories -- small business (under 25 employees), medium business (25 to 100 employees), and large business. Around 30 businesses were nominated for this year's award from among the 500 who participate in PIC programs in Perry, Posey, Spencer, Warrick, and Vanderburgh counties.

In addition to support of PIC programs, the businesses are recognized on the basis of hiring practices and what is done for employees after they are hired, and support for and contributions to southwest Indiana communities. The University support of PIC has included hiring nine employees from PIC training programs in Gibson, Posey, and Vanderburgh counties in 1989 and being a work site for the Summer Youth Employment Program the past 10 years.

The 1850 Doctor's Office and Lesueur Museum are two new features of the New Harmony walking tour. The two-room Victorian period doctor's office includes a medical collection donated by Mead Johnson Foundation that is considered one of the most complete examples of equipment and materials used by physicians in the last half

of the nineteenth century. The Indian museum traces the history of Tri-state Indian cultures from 10,000 B.C. to the present. The sculpture was created by USI graduate Mr. Tim Fitzgerald and donated to Historic New Harmony by Mr. Paul Arnold, Evansville attorney. The tree has been planted at the doctor's office site, a gift of Southwest Garden Clubs of Indiana.

HOOSIER TEACHERS IN READING PROGRAM. More than 350 middle school teachers throughout Indiana are participating in the reading project, "Teachers Under Cover," directed by Dr. Aldo F. Cardarelli, USI professor of education. 
