United Way Campaign

Faculty, staff urged to support "Home Team"

The 1994 United Way campaign started this week and will run through October. The campaign chairs -- Ms. Debbie Clark, library assistant; Mrs. Kathy Funke, director of News and Information Services; and Dr. Charles F. Petranek, Sociology Department chair -- have enlisted 36 coordinators to help reach the campaign goal of \$27,000, a 17 percent increase over 1993.

"The United Way of Southwestern Indiana has set a goal of \$4 million this year," said Dr. Petranek, "That is a 17 percent increase for total giving and we felt the USI faculty and staff, especially with the number of new faculty, should set a similar percentage increase for the University."

Coordinators will follow the campaign theme "Cheer for the Home Team" in seeking contributions that help fund local United Way agencies. That local effort has helped the "home team" by keeping 99 percent of the contributions in the community. The 1994 USI coordinators are:

On the Verge will be presented October 6-16. Mr. Overmyer's postmodern fantasy is a poetically-charged absurdist comedy. The play follows the trek of three 19thcentury women explorers who traverse a region they call "terra incognita," the last unexplored area on the planet. To their surprise, their terrain becomes the future century, a random stream of linguistic slang, fashion trends, and forgotten inventions — all presented along a roller coaster ride filled with wit, sentiment, and unique insight.

Performances will be at 8 p.m. Thursday through Saturday and 2 p.m. Sundays at USI Theatre, 3001 Igleheart Avenue. Ticket prices remain the same -- \$5 for the University community and senior citizens, and \$7, general admission.
