



COMMENCEMENT 1979. The 1979 Commencement will be held Saturday, May 12 at 10:00 a.m. in the Vanderburgh County Civic Auditorium in downtown Evansville.

Approximately 400 students will be completing degree requirements for associate and baccalaureate degrees. The speaker this year is Mr. William Burleigh, editor of The Cincinnati Post. Honorary degrees will be awarded to Mr. Burleigh; William

Hitch, president of Hitch Packing Company of Princeton and a former ISU Trustee; John and Josephine Elliott, civic leaders and educators; and E. Donald Elliott, vice president for personnel at Mead Johnson Company.

Faculty members and administrative personnel who are participating in commencement will assemble in the Gold Room of the Auditorium no later than 9:30 a.m. Please bring your academic regalia with you. The academic procession will begin forming at 9:45 a.m. Graduates will assemble in the Gold Room at 9:00 a.m.

Ample seating is available for family and friends who wish to attend the Commencement ceremony. No tickets will be issued and all are welcome.

They were chosen for their participation and leadership in numerous ISUE and community activities.

The runner-up Coed was Jeanie Fuchs, sponsored by Alpha Omega Psi, and the runner-up for Bachelor was Tony Scales for Sigma Tau Gamma.

ALL EIGHT STUDENTS ACCEPTED TO PROFESSIONAL SCHOOLS. ISUE is proud to congratulate its students who recently applied and were accepted into their chosen professional programs.

Recently all eight ISUE students who applied to professional schools were accepted. These students, all graduating from the Division of Science and Math, will attend the following schools: Susan Bunch, who will enter Medical School at University Louisville; John Clayton who will attend Illinois College of Podiatric Medicine at Chicago; J. Brad Wilson who will attend Dental School at Indiana University; Michael Walker who will enter Dental School at the University of Kentucky; and the Medical School at Indiana University has accepted Rogert D. Barnes III, Larry Holder, Steve Allyn, and Michael Simmons.

Three of the last four years, ISUE students have achieved an 100% acceptance rate into the IU Medical School program.

ISUE'S YEARBOOK AND LITERARY MAGAZINE RECOGNIZED. The Indiana Collegiate Press Association, in presenting the 1979 awards to recognize the best in Indiana collegiate publications, judged ISUE's literary magazine and yearbook to be among the best.

Moving Finger, ISUE's magazine, under Barb Hass' editorship, received an Honorable Mention after placing well in six out of the ten categories. It won Best Cover Design for the October '78 issue and an Honorable Mention in the category for the February '78 issue. The October '78 issue also was chosen Best Overall Make-Up of a Single Edition. The students' individual poems, essays, short stories, and art work all did well. Moving Finger, which is published biannually, is the oldest of ISUE's student publications.

Transitions was voted third in the Division II Yearbook of the Year contest. It took first place in the Best Campus Events Coverage category and also placed in Best Handling of Copy, Best Cover, Best Features, and Best Make-Up. Kim Melloy was editor of the winning edition.

ANN HUMPHREY, director of publications at ISUE, acted as advisor for both the literary magazine and the yearbook.

ISUE STUDENT IN GERMANY. The ISUE German Club sponsored their first annual German language study tour to Europe. Fourteen participants, including ten members of the University community and four family members of theirs, left Chicago O'Hare Airport on Friday, April 13 and spent their first night in the old university city of Heidelberg.

They travelled by bus to Munich where FREDERICKA SCHMADEL, German instructor, led them through the pedestrian zone downtown to the doors of the famous Hofbräuhaus. Participants visited five castles, Dachau concentration camp, the Deutsches Museum (of Engineering and Technology), Oberammergau (site of the famous Passion Play), Garmisch-Partenkirchen, Salzburg in Austria, and rode by cable car to the top of the Zugspitze, tallest mountain in Germany. On the way back to Luxembourg they explored Rothenburg, where a medieval city complete with surrounding moat and city wall has been preserved. In Munich they enjoyed a performance of the Mozart opera.

The many other educational experiences will be described in a Humanities Forum slide show in September.

ALUMNI SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS. Through the cooperation of DAVID DEERING, Bookstore manager, and the ISUE Bookstore, the ISUE Alumni Association has undertaken this project in an attempt to raise additional funds for student scholarships.
