HUMANITIES FORUM. The ISUE Humanities Forum on April 19 will cover the "Role of Women in Southeast Asia." Guest speakers will be Mrs. Somsri Kantamala of Bangkok, Thailand, and Mrs. Ng Poh Tip, of Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia. The two women are members of a speaking tour organized by the Overseas Educational Fund of the League of Women Voters under a grant from the Bureau of Cultural and Educational Affairs of the Department of State. The program is designed to increase American awareness of issues in developing countries; the women will speak on the developing world and the role women play in their nations' development.

The Forum, open to the public, will be held in the University Center at 11:00 a.m.

BIOETHICS SERIES. "The Quality of Our Bioethical Decisions: The Individual and Society" will be the third topic explored in the ISUE sponsored lecture/discussion series, Bioethics: The Interface of Biology and Society on April 14, 1977.

Dr. Hans Uffelman, Chairman of the Department of Philosophy and Professor of Philosophy and Medicine at the University of Missouri, will be discussing the evening's topic via a broadcast originating at Ball State University. Following his comments a panel of local persons will react to the topic and lead discussion from the audience.

Members of the local panel will be three ISUE faculty members, *MIKE DENNER*, Professor of Life Science, *JACK MARR*, Associate Professor of Life Science; and *HOWARD GABENNESCH*, Assistant Professor of Sociology.

The session is open to the public and will meet in A34 of the Administration Building at 7:00 p.m. Three subsequent forums will be presented on Thursday evenings at ISUE. The programs are designed to make the public aware of the dimensions and potential of biological technological issues facing today's society. Admission is free. The program is sponsored by ISUE Campus Ministry and Continuing Education.

EVENTS IN NEW HARMONY. "Dames at Sea" will be presented by the Evansville Civic Theatre on Saturday, April 16 and Sunday, April 17 in Murphy Auditorium in New Harmony.
