FAMILY DAY WILL SHOWCASE USI

The first annual Family Day will be held Saturday and Sunday, September 28-29, showcasing the University of Southern Indiana for the University community, their families and friends, and the public. The observance is sponsored by the student Activities Programming Board and the USI Alumni Association.

Programs that have become popular over the years will be highlighted. For example, **Dr. Sue Donaldson**, a psychology professor who has done some turns as a stand-up comic, will discuss "Comedy in the Classroom" at 2 and 3 p.m. Saturday in the Orr Center. At the same times, **Dr. Marie Hankins**, chair of the Physical Sciences Department, will be in Forum III, repeating

the chemistry demonstrations that are popular with young and old alike.

At 2:30 and 3:30 p.m., **Dr. Greg Valentine**, assistant professor of business, will present the "Snickeromics" program he devised to put economics in human terms for the younger students he meets. He will be in OC2008, while **Mr. Robert Jeffers**, communications lecturer and track announcer at Ellis Park, is tentatively scheduled to present a program in OC2036 at the same times.

Mr. Steven Williford, theatre director, and the USI Playmakers will present a one-act play at 4 p.m. in Forum I, to demonstrate the quality of the University's growing theatre program.

The showcase will begin at 1 p.m. Saturday, with registration and a welcoming

program. During the afternoon, visitors also will have a choice of walking tours of the campus, trolley tours of student housing, a Student Art Show in the University Center, and exhibits by students and Historic New Harmony. The student radio station, WSWI, will do a live remote broadcast from the UC lawn.

The band SIBECO will entertain during a family picnic, which starts at 5 p.m. on the UC back lawn. Visitors may finish off their day at the nearby USI/Kenny Kent Toyota Soccer Tournament, with Northeast Missouri meeting Mercyhurst at 5:30 p.m. and USI and Longwood playing at 8 p.m.

Sunday's activities will include an ecumenical worship service at 10 a.m. in UC350. Brunch in the UC Dining Room between 10:30 a.m. and 1 p.m. will wind up the weekend's events. *contd. on page 2*

ELEEMOSYNARY TO CLOSE SEASON FOR THE NEW HARMONY THEATRE

The New Harmony Theatre's highly successful Season '91 will close in October with the presentation of Lee Blessing's tragicomedy, *Eleemosynary*. The play will open on Friday, October 4, and run through October 26 at Murphy Auditorium in New Harmony. Curtain time is 8 p.m. Fridays and Saturdays and 2 p.m. Sundays.

Mr. Steven Williford, USI theatre director and artistic director for New Harmony, is directing this final Season '91 performance by New Harmony veterans **Ms. Sara Morsey** and **Ms. Jennifer Hubbard**. They are being joined by **Ms. Mitzi Friedlander**, a newcomer to the New Harmony stage. All three are from Louisville. **Ms. Hubbard** and **Ms. Morsey** are spending their second summer with New Harmony and were in each of the earlier Season '91 productions -- *The Trip to Bountiful*, *Blithe Spirit*, and *Cat on a Hot Tin Roof*. **Ms. Friedlander** has spent her life in theatre, including Actors Theatre of Louisville, the University of Louisville's Belknap Theatre, and Pegasus Rising Productions, among others.

Eleemosynary premiered in Philadelphia in 1986 and opened in the spring of 1989 in New York. The play probes the delicate re-

lationships of three singular women: Dorothea (**Ms. Friedlander**), the grandmother who has sought to assert her independence through strong-willed eccentricity; her brilliant daughter, **Artie** (**Ms. Morsey**), who has fled the stifling domination of her mother; and **Artie's** daughter, **Echo** (**Ms. Hubbard**), a child of exceptional intellect -- and sensitivity -- whom **Artie** has abandoned to an upbringing by **Dorothea**. The opening scene explains the title as champion speller **Echo** walks on stage spelling "E-L..E-E..M-O-S..Y..N-A-R..Y. It's my favorite word. Not just because I won with it either. It was always my favorite. *Eleemosynary*. 'Of or pertaining to alms; charitable'." **Dorothea** suffers a stroke and eventually dies, leaving **Artie** and **Echo** to accept their mutual need and try to build a life together after years of alienation and estrangement. "A funny, perceptive, and eloquently written play" is typical of the review plaudits which have greeted performances of *Eleemosynary*.

The New Harmony Theatre is produced by the USI School of Liberal Arts. Tickets for this final production are \$10, with a special rate available for parties of 20 or more. A USI student rate of \$3 is available, limited to one-per-student; students are

Craftspeople will set up shop all around town and Historic New Harmony will open its doors to visitors for Kunstfest, the tenth annual German craft festival to be held the weekend of September 21-22. Visitors will see how 19th century men handled black-powder firearms or built furniture or treenware (wooden utensils), how women made clothes, dyed wool, or dipped candles, and how children made rope, wove cloth, or gardened. Fresh-made bread, kuchen, applebutter, cider, and bratwurst will be available.

The fest will be open from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Saturday and 12 noon to 4:30 p.m.

STOCK MARKET WORKSHOPS. Some 50 southern Indiana teachers are expected

to attend a workshop Thursday, September 12, at USI and Tuesday, September 17, in Jasper, preparing them to organize students and run this year's Stock Market Game in grades four through 12 in Indiana schools. The game is sponsored by the Indiana Securities Office in the office of Secretary of State. A securities office representative is expected to speak at the workshops. The Stock Market Game will start September 27 and run 10 weeks, with student teams to be given \$100,000 each to invest. Dr. Gregory P. Valentine, assistant professor of business, is in charge of the southern section of the game, which accounted for a third of the 1,200 participants in 1990's game.

vative processes to improve productivity, employee relations, and competitiveness.

NEW HARMONY EXHIBIT. The New Harmony State Historic Site will sponsor a new exhibition, "The Afterglow: Drawings from the New Harmony Collection, 1826-1862," opening Sunday, September 15, at the Scholle House. It will feature more than 35 works highlighting the "afterglow" period following the end of the Owenite communal society in New Harmony. Many artists attracted to the Owen community stayed on, and continued to do innovative work. The works of three are featured in "The Afterglow" -- the architectural renderings, survey maps, and mechanical drawings of steam engines, textile machinery, and various inventions created by Oliver Evans, Jr., Robert H. Fauntleroy, and Robert A. Fauntleroy, all of whom lived in what is known as the Fauntleroy Home. These works were collected by Mary E. Fauntleroy, a descendant who lived in the home in the early 20th century. They were rediscovered in 1971 by Mrs. Josephine Elliott, USI archivist emerita, and placed in the Workingmen's Institute archives. The exhibition will continue through December 15 at the Scholle House. Call 464-9585 for information.
