SUMMER ENROLLMENT UP. The 1976 First Summer Session at ISUE has a total enrollment of 904 students. This figure was computed with two days of late registration yet to go, and still tops the 1975 First Summer enrollment by 46 students.

The Second Summer Session will begin on July 13 with registration on July 12. The session will end on August 13.

Persons interested in enrolling for the Second Summer Session can obtain a complete schedule of classes from the Registrar's Office.

SECRETARIES OF ISUE TO MEET. The Secretaries of ISUE will hold their final meeting before the summer break on Thursday, June 17 from 11:45 a.m.-1:00 p.m. in the University Center Cafeteria. There will not be a speaker as the meeting time will be used to install the new officers for the 1976-77 year. Secretaries planning to attend the meeting may bring their lunch or go to the Snack Bar. PUBLIC HEARING ON STRIPMINING BILL. There will be a public hearing on the Stripmining Bill at the Civic Center, Room 301, Council Chambers, at 7:00 p.m. on June 22. The bill calls for banning of all stripmining in Vanderburgh County. Anyone with a view on this issue can make an appearance and express it. *J. M. Barnes*, Assistant Professor of Geology/Geography, is asking that all faculty members announce the hearing in their classes.

1976-77 STATE SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS. The Office of Student Financial Aids recently received notification from the State Scholarship Commission of Indiana that 200 ISUE students have been awarded State Scholarships for the 1976-77 academic year totaling \$124,170. Two of the recipients are from Daviess County, one from Dearborn, ten from Dubois, fifteen from Gibson, one from Knox, one from Lawrence, ten from Perry, five from Pike, fifteen from Posey, one from Rush, eight from Spencer, 114 from Vanderburgh, and seventeen from Warrick County. In addition, Honorary State Scholarships have been awarded to 264 students.

The State Scholarship is made available by the State General Assembly to be used at Indiana colleges and universities and is based upon financial need and academic ability. It is designed to pay a portion of the student's tuition, or in some cases the total amount, depending upon the student's financial need. In order to be considered for a State Scholarship, the student must submit an application and Parents' Confidential Statement to the State Scholarship Commission prior to his freshman year in college. The scholarship is renewable for three years following the presentation of the first award.

SUMMER CHEERLEADING CLINIC. The ISUE Athletic Department is sponsoring a summer cheerleading clinic for tri-state grade school and high school students during the week of June 28-July 2. Cheerleading squads are invited to the clinic, however it is not necessary to be a cheerleader to attend. The clinic will meet Monday through Friday, from 1:00-4:00 p.m.

The clinic will be conducted by Ruth Schwenk, teacher and cheerleading sponsor at Holy Spirit School. Cheerleading advisors and collegiate cheerleaders, selected for their cheerleading accomplishments, will assist with the clinic.

The primary goal of the summer session is to teach the individual the best cheers and techniques for the right time and situation. The instruction will include competition, crowd pleasing chants and yells, pom-pom routines, mounts, cheerleading gymnastics, double stunts and the best jumps for use in all cheers. The staff will provide the participants information on warm-ups, practice schedules, rules and cheerleading duties.

The final day of the clinic will be highlighted by an All-Star cheerleaders competition. Excellence will be rewarded with special ribbons and trophies. ISUE STAFF MEMBERS CO-AUTHOR BOOK. New Harmony's Fourth of July Tradition, co-authored by Donald Pitzer, Professor of History, and Josephine Elliott, Archivist, relates the history of the New Harmony Fourth of July tradition, extending from 1815 to the present. The tradition was begun by the Harmonist founders of the town, and always included music by the Harmonist band, free beer, and a free dinner as well.

When Robert Owen purchased New Harmony in 1825, the Fourth of July tradition continued, but in a different manner. Many of the people who were attracted to New Harmony by Owen were well-educated individuals interested in orally praising the Declaration of Independence and the American federated republic that it made possible. Three representative addresses from this period, as printed in the New-Harmony Gazette, are reproduced verbatim in New Harmony's Fourth of July Tradition.

The first address, dated July 4, 1826, is by Robert Owen, who purchased New Harmony from its Harmonist founders the year before as the site of his communal model of utopia. The following year, his son, William, gave the Fourth of July address, which is also reproduced in this text. And the third address, dated July 4, 1828, was given by Frances Wright, one of the most radical social reformers in 19th century America. Her appearance as the main speaker for the Fourth of July celebration was an unprecedented event in America for one of her sex.

In addition to the well-educated individuals of New Harmony, there were also many Owenites who were common working-class Americans. They might applaud a fine speech, but were more apt to enjoy the other activities of the Fourth, which included early morning ringing of the town bells, the firing of the cannon, marching in military parades, as well as afternoon picnics and barbecues and a late night dance in the town hall. Some of these aspects of the New Harmony tradition are represented at the end of the text in sketches by Charles Alexander Lesueur, an artist and scientist of the Owen community.

ISUE STAFF MEMBERS CO-AUTHOR BOOK, CONTINUED. Dr. Pitzer and Mrs. Elliott are presently working on an illustrated history of New Harmony, and from this work stemmed their idea for New Harmony's Fourth of July Tradition. Copies of the small text are available in the Bookstore at \$2.50 per copy.

- SALE ITEM:** Salvage brick pavers generated by renovation of the patio north of the Science/Administration Building.
- METHOD OF SALE:** The brick pavers shall be sold in lots of 100 square feet, (450 pavers per lot) on a first come first serve basis. One lot per individual for the period beginning 6/16/76 through 6/25/76. Additional lots may be purchased after 6/25/76 if available. Interested persons may purchase the brick pavers by signing up at the ISUE Purchasing Office, Administration Building, Room 106A.
- NOMENCLATURE:** Brick paver, smooth top, ridged base, deep red (black-red) in color, 8" x 4" x 1" thick.
- CONDITION:** Most pavers whole, some with mitered edges, many require chipping of mortar to be used.
- AVAILABILITY:** Pavers may be inspected at the ISUE Maintenance Barn.
- QUANTITY:** 1400 square feet @ .2222 square feet per paver equalling 6300 pavers total, broken down into 14 lots of 100 square feet equalling 450 pavers per lot.

- PAYMENTS:** Shall be cash or check to be paid at the Bursar's Office, Administration Building, on the date of the sale prior to pick-up of the brick pavers.
