HOMECOMING WEEK. The Activity Programming Board has scheduled several events during Homecoming Week, February 20-25. Voting for King and Queen candidates will be held Monday-Friday from 10:00 p.m. - 2:00 p.m. in the UC Lounge, and Monday-Wednesday from 5:30 - 6:00 p.m. in the Redwood Lobby. The videotape of the movie Ghandi will be shown in the UC Lounge Monday-Wednesday at 8:30 a.m., 3:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. An arm wrestling contest is scheduled on Monday, a bubble-gum blowing contest will be Tuesday, and a trivia quiz will be held Thursday and Friday. On Wednesday, comedian T. P. Mulrooney will perform in the UC Lounge at 11:00 a.m. and 12:00 noon.

Homecoming activities culminate Saturday, February 25 with sports contests and alumni activities. The old-timers game between former ISUE basketball players will begin at 3:00 p.m. in the PAC. A reception for old-timers will follow the game in the Eagles Nest. At 5:00 p.m., ISUE's Lady Eagles meet the Lewis women, and at 7:30 p.m., the ISUE men's team plays Lewis' men. At half time of the men's game, the Homecoming Court will be presented and the King and Queen will be announced.

Following the game, the Alumni Association will host a reception for alumni, faculty, and staff at the University Home from 9:30 to 11:30 p.m.

The Homecoming dance, sponsored by APB, will be in the UC Dining Room after the game.

CONGRATULATIONS TO ISUE WOMEN. Congratulations to ISUE women Nancy Allen, Karin Naab and Donna Myers, who have been named in the newly-published volume of "Outstanding Young Women of America."

THE PRESIDENT'S MEDAL. The President's Medal will be presented for the first time during the 1984 Honors Day Ceremony. The award will be given to a graduating senior who has demonstrated a commitment toward excellence on the academic level as well as service to the University and the Community.

Applicants must have a grade point average of at least 3.70. They must have completed at least 75 hours at Indiana State University Evansville at the time of application, and must have applied for graduation.

Three letters of recommendation which attest to the student's character as well as achievements should be sent to the chairperson of the Student Academic Affairs Committee. Two letters should be sent from faculty members (one from the student's division is recommended) and one from a personal source. The letters should include an evaluation of the student according to these criteria:

- (a) character--integrity, honesty, professionalism, maturity;
- (b) accomplishments--both important achievements and significant endeavors;
- (c) service--to the University and the community; and
- (d) promise--not only for succeeding in career or graduate studies, but also (and perhaps most important) for serving his fellow men.

Applicants should submit an application by March 5. The Student Academic Affairs Committee will conduct personal interviews with the leading candidates for the award. Based upon the application, the letters of recommendation, and the interviews, a recipient will be selected. The chairperson of the Student Academic Affairs Committee will notify the President's Office, which will notify the student of the award.

PEOPLE IN THE NEWS. Dr. J. Eliseo DaRosa, professor of economics, participated in the program of the XXIV Conference of the Inter-American Bar Association, held in Panama City, Panama, February 4-10, 1984. Professor DaRosa co-chaired the sessions of the Natural Resources and Environment Protection Committee and presented a paper titled, "Legal and Economic Problems in the Pricing of Electric Power in the Regional Markets, The Rio de la Plata."

In the first of a three-part program on "Women in the Cultural Community," Kathryn Waters, assistant professor of art, will present a slide-illustrated lecture on "Women in the Visual Arts," highlighting women artists and women as subject matter for the artists. Her presentation is scheduled for Tuesday, February 21 in front of a network of Evansville women. The price for the luncheon will be \$8.25 per person.
